It appears that the Thursday night show at the Christiansted Theatre is a dead letter at present. No show for two Thursday nights since Mr. Svendsen left for Denmark. What is really the cause? We read in your paper of yesterday "as new arrangements have been made with regard to delivery of Films there will be no show Thursday night." Do we understand that to mean that there will be show on Monday nights only, or what? Patrons of the Theatre had got quite accustomed to these entertainments very instructive at times, and we are sorry to see that one of the nights seems to have sunk into oblivion.

Our sister island St. Thomas is well off for cine shows. There are the Cine America and the New Apollo Theatre, in which some very up-to-date dramas are being shown. What are the "new arrangements"? If the "Creole" gets here on Wednesday morning, isn't that time enough to get the film here for Thursday evening. If even that is not satisfactory, can't arrangements be made with Porto Rico, and have our films come direct. There are some fine pictures we see advertised in the St. Thomas papers that we never see here. Must we always

be satisfied to wait until somebody else is finished with a certain thing before we can use it—whether that thing be an engine, a saw-mill or films for the movies etc.?

Something more. "The Lion Man" that interesting serial is so cut up now, or in other words, only four chapters are shown every Monday evening, that it is difficult for one to grasp the story. We understand this is no fault of the Manager of the Theatre, but we hope some effort will be made to adjust this matter for future serials. Let us have six chapters twice a week. We are sure the acting Manager will do his best for his patrons.

In conclusion we beg to inform other patrons of the Theatre that the famous Lowande and Gardner Circus, well known here, is expected in St. Thomas tomorrow (Friday). We hope these artists will not leave out St. Croix in their tour. We extend a cordial invitation to them.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, May 9th.—Sentiment in German political circles was showing a drift at noon today in favour of agreeing to the Allied reparations terms. It is now believed a parliamentary coalition which will accept the Allied ultimatum will be constituted within the next 24 hours.

Paris, May 9th.—United States representation at the Allied conference was resumed today, when Mr. Wallace, the American Ambassador, took his seat at a session of the council of ambassadors here. Mr. Wallace received his instructions last night from the Secretary of State to represent his Govt. at the ambassadorial conferences. His appearance was warmly greeted by M. Cambon, the president of the council, and other members of that body. Mr. Wallace was given a seat at M. Cambon's right. The problem of Upper Silesia was the subject of the deliberations of the council this morning. Mr. Boyden, who formerly sat with the Allied representation committee at its sessions, has received invitations to resume his seat with that body.

Paris, May 9th.—M. Jonnart, ex-Allied High Commissioner at Athens and extraordinary Ambassador to the Vatican, has been definitely selected by the French Government, according to "Le-clair" today, as Ambassador to the Vatican.

Stockholm, May 9th.—Capital punishment in Sweden has been abolished by a measure passed by the Rikstag.

Berlin, May 8th.—Germany has concluded a preliminary trade agreement with Soviet Russia and the convention became effective on May 6th, according to the official text which has been made public here.

Berlin, May 9th.—Reports from German sources declare that advices from Upper Silesia, up till last night, showed no diminution in the gravity of the situation there, caused by the Polish insurgent movement.

New York, May 9th.—The break of a quarter of a cent in the delivered price of raw sugars, made by the sale late on Wednesday of 10,000 bags of Porto Rico's in port, to the Federal at 4.64c. cif, equivalent to 3.375c. cif, for Cuba's as reported yesterday, tended to increase the unsettled feeling at the opening yesterday. However, for the present holders appear to be disinclined to make further concessions, although on the
