A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the President of the United States of America has proclaimed Armistice Day, 11th November 1921, as a legal holiday out of respect to the memory of the men who heroically gave their lives for our country in the world war:

NOW THEREFORE, I, SUMNER E. W. KITTELLE, Governor of the Virgin Islands of the United States, do hereby set apart FRIDAY, 11TH NOVEMBER 1921, and proclaim it a public holiday within the Virgin Islands of the United States for the purpose of observing Armistice Day.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Government of the Virgin Islands of the United States to be affixed.

Issued at St. Thomas, this seventh day of November, 1921.
