TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Jan. 7th.—The arrival of the United States dreadnought "Colorado" at Portsmouth today is an event of con-

siderable interest in Admiralty circles and of even greater popular interest, because the "Colorado" is the largest of foreign warships ever to visit Great Britain.

Dublin, Jan. 7th.—The first appearance of the Irish Free State loan bonds on the Dublin Stock Exchange caused extensive excited dealings. Everybody wanted to buy at the outset and the quotation quickly reached 99, or four points higher than the issue price. The market closed steady at the best point touched.

London, Jan. 7th.—An unusual incident occurred in Westminster Abbey at the service last evening, when Canon Barnes, in the course of his sermon, advised his congregation not to sell their British stocks because of the present political situation. A country which had such fundamental unity as the British people possessed, he said, could rejoice in its democratic constitution and the British people had no occasion to fear the consequence of a political change. Canon Barnes is regarded as one of the finest intellectual lights among the English Clergy.

London, Jan. 8th.—Sugar in stock on the 5th inst. was 40,000 tons. Last year 120,000 tons.

New Orleans, La. Jan. 7th.—Tampico has been captured by rebel forces, according to a New Orleans daily, which bases its story on information received through Mexican revolutionary circles here.

Washington, Jan. 7th.—The United States declared an arms embargo to prevent purchase of war materials in the United States by the Mexican revolutionists. A proclamation putting the embargo into effect was signed late today by President Coolidge.

London, Jan. 7th.—Scientific investigations will be combined with the more romantic objects of treasure hunting, when sixty persons set off for the South Pacific in the 1,300 ton yacht St. George the latter part of this month. Supported by the British scientific expeditionary research association, the party, which numbers some of the best known ethnologists, geologists, ornithologists and entomologists of great Britain, will cruise for ten months among the little known islands of the Pacific, for scientific researches. Incidentally the party will have a fling at the outset at the treasure which tradition says the pirate "Morgan" buried on Cocos Island, off the Central American Coast, a century ago. The members of the expedition are said to have received new information concerning the alleged location of the treasure, the value of which is placed by some accounts as high as £8,000,000. The St. George will call on the way from England at Madeira and Trinidad and proceed thence through the Panama Canal to Cocos Island. Afterward the yacht will proceed to the South Pacific

and carry out the scientific investigations planned. The trip will cover about 25,000 miles.

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 7th.—With the seven men of her skeleton crew safe, but said to be suffering intensely from cold, the old battleship "Louisiana" was located at 10.30 o'clock today, after drifting at the will of a heavy gale since Saturday night, when she broke from moorings eighty miles at sea, and was being labouriously towed in tonight by the cutters Manning and Mascoutin. It was hoped that abatement of the weather would permit an increase in the speed of less than two knots an hour, so the battleship could be brought back to port by late tomorrow. Because of high seas, no attempt has been made by the cutters to remove the men from the battleship, but it was said this probably would be done tomorrow.

London Jan. 8th.—Although the assembly today met in an atmosphere of eager political expectation, the first session itself offered no opportunity for sensational development, for its only immediate business was the unopposed re-election of the Rt. Hon. John Henry Whitley as speaker of the House of Commons, with the customary felicitations from the leaders of the three political parties. The swearing in of the new members chosen at the election of December 6th follows, and the remainder of the week in the House of Commons will be occupied with these preliminary formalities. The real political interest of the next few days lies outside Parliament, namely, in the meeting places of the various parties and in their consultations, at which the country's immediate political future will be shaped. These meetings will be private and it is not supposed that the decisions reached will be publicly announced. Today's session of the National Executive Committee of the Labour Party to reelect Mr. Ramsay Mac Donald as Leader and to appoint the party's officers for the session, is the first assembly of the committee since Labour decided to accept office, if the opportunity arose, and it was assumed that the sessions would be of first rate importance. This evening there will be a labour demonstration in the Albert Hall, when Mr. Mac Donald and other leaders of the party will make speeches, which perhaps will deal with Labour's future policy, although there is no certainty that any unusually interesting statements will be made. No fixed programmes for the conservative and Liberal Party meetings have been announced. The lobbies of Parliament, however, were the centres today of much discussion, which doubtless will give rise to a flood of rumours and surmises. It is understood that the Cabinet meets tomorrow for a final drafting of the speech from the Throne at the formal opening of Parliament next week.
