TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, April 12th.—The reparations commission today discussed the reply of Chancellor Wirth to the commissions recent note relative to the reparation demands and decided to send a new note to Germany, of which the terms will be decided upon tomorrow. It appears certain that the commission will adhere to the decision of March 21st granting Germany a moratorium until the 31st May, and that at the latter date they will decide if they will confirm or cancel the provisional moratorium. In consequence, Germany is compelled to pay eighteen million gold marks on the 15th April and fifty millions on the 15th May. It is rumoured that the Allied Supreme Council will meet at Genoa towards the end of the month, but official circles decline to confirm the news. The object of this meeting would be to discuss the actual situation on the question of reparations, following the recent German note refusing to accept some of the chief conditions of the Allies relative to partial moratorium.

London, April 12th.—An endeavour to substitute an aristocracy of brains for an aristocracy of birth, is embodied in a bill for the reconstruction of the House of Lords, which Colonel Claude Lowther today obtained the permission of the House of Commons to present. This was Colonel Lowther's statement, when making his application for the privilege
