Lieut. (j. g.) Harold K. Smoot, U. S. Navy has been appointed Communication Officer at the Naval Station, St. Thomas, in place of Major R. B. Sullivan, U. S. Marine Corps, who has been relieved at his own request.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

The Municipal Police Commission will

receive applications for appointment as District Chief of Police, Municipality of St. Thomas and St. John until August 10th.

In view of the collision of two automobiles recently at the Grand Hotel corner, the Director of Police requested all owners of automobiles and chauffeurs to assemble at the Fort yesterday. The Acting Police Master after hearing of all parties interested issued new traffic regulations governing vehicles on Norre Gade, Polley Berg, Beltjen Road and La Beet's Hill, which will be published tomorrow. East or west bound traffic will hereafter be given right-of-way over north or south bound traffic.

I may mention in connection therewith that rumour says that on Sunday there was a strike among the workers removing the landed cargo to the Custom House. In very many cases strikes are justifiable. while the bulk of consumers would have had to indirectly defray the cost by meeting an additional rise which most likely would have taken place in the already existing high prices.

There ought to be no profiteering however, and a crisis on Sunday was manfully averted, and additional losses prevented by Mr. William Abramson's willingly coming to the rescue and removing the goods with his own carts and men, even lending his personal assistance.

Such is genuine cooperation and Mr. Abramson really deserves the praise and thanks not only of his competitors, but of the general public.

If the Herald is for the interest of the people then when I, the leader of the members of the Federal Labor Union No. 17216, also a Share holder of said paper send an article to the President and Editor of the Herald with nothing libelous, what is the cause of it not being published?

Again chances for firemen to make from \$95.00 to 125.00 per month and it was hampered, tell me then if that is working for the people and with the people and in the interest of the community.

Here is one good thing that I will like to put before you that is, it was immaterial to me whether the men desirous of the opportunity were members of the Federation which is an International Institution or the Labor Union which is a local Institution.

It was only that the people whom, you, President and Editor, profess to have so much interest in should be given their chances in the commercial World.

I would like to know from the President and Editor of the Herald and Chief of the Educational Department if such article is detrimental to the laboring masses.

When it is proven then will I submit.

For as I know and you know that the people needs to know more about the outer world than they at present do know.

And it will help us to manage them better and get men who with International ideas while they are placed on the Board of Management will be of Intellectual use.

But the President and Chief of the Educational Department being such a selfish, conspicuous and intolerant man that he will not have men who he believes will argue with him on the Board
