Item 6.

Election of 2 men to take part with Government in deciding on the application to be made of the Golden Wedding Legacy of their Majesties the King and Queen.

Election of do. of the Silver Wedding Legacy of their Royal Highnesses the Crown Prince and Crown Princess.

Election of do. of the Nuptial Fund of His Royal Highness Prince Valdemar.

Election of do. of the P. C. Birch and wife Rosaline Antoinette's Legacy.

The Chairman remarked: It had always been the custom to elect 2 men for all four Legacies and he would therefore follow precedent.

17 voting tickets were handed in.

Elected was 2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) with 13 votes and 1st Member for Frederiksted Town (Coulter) with 13 votes.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood), 3rd Member for Christiansted Town (Alexander), 2nd Member for Christiansted Country District (Nelthropp) and 2nd Member for Frederiksted Town (Merwin) received 1 vote respectively.

Item 7.

Election of Members for the Commission pursuant to Paragraph 1 of Ordinance of 20th September, 1911, regarding Measures against Diseases of Cotton Plants.

The Chairman read Government's letter and said, —Messrs. A. V. Nelthropp, H. Madsen and N. Thornberg and the late Mr. S. Jorgensen were elected in June, 1920.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) was of the opinion that the letter read by the Chairman was not correct as Messrs. Thornberg and Madsen were not considered eligible, they being Danish citizens.

The Chairman remarked: In view of the question raised I will postpone the matter.

The matter was accordingly postponed.

Election of a Jury Commissioner:

15 voting tickets were handed in.

Elected was 1st Appointed Member (Henderson) with 12 votes.

5th Appointed Member (McIntosh), 1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) and 3rd Member for Christiansted Town (Alexander) received 1 vote respectively.

Election of one member to serve on the Library Commission.

15 voting tickets were handed in, two were blank.

Elected was 1st Member for Frederiksted Town (Coulter) with 9 votes.

2nd Member for Frederiksted Town (Merwin) received 2 votes, 1st Member

for Christiansted Town (Abramson) and 2nd Member for said Town (Canegata) received 1 vote respectively.

The Chairman then gave a recess of 15 minutes.

After recess the Council reconvened and the Chairman brought up item 8 of the Order of the Day.

Item 8.

Colonial Council Bill No. 14.

Continuation of 1st Discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 14, Draft of an Ordinance introduced by 4th Member for Frederiksted Country District (Fleming), providing for the repairing and rolling of the center line road.

The Chairman remarked: I have to announce that at the meeting of the Council held on April 24th a Money Bill providing for a road roller, stone crusher and scarifier has been passed and approved by the Governor in whole on the 1st of May, 1922, and as Bill No 14 has been continued pending decision on the Money Bill, the Bill is brought up again. I will ask the proponent of the Bill to speak upon it.

4th Member for Frederiksted Country District (Fleming) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I would like to hear the views of the Council on this matter. The Committee appointed to receive and report on this Bill has sent in its report.

The Chairman read the Money Bill referred to and said, —The Money Bill has been passed and approved by the Governor as announced. The intention now is to provide means for working the road roller. The question is whether the tax as fixed in this Ordinance is sufficient to cover the cost of maintaining the road roller.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 21st.—Mr. Lloyd George in the course of an interview on his arrival here yesterday dwelt mainly upon what he characterized as the most dramatic spectacle ever witnessed at any conference, when he representatives of more than thirty nations rose and solemnly pledged themselves, in the face of the world, to non-aggression. "We must remember", he added, "that only a few weeks ago armies were massing on frontiers, extending for thousands of miles, with the evident intention of marching against each other and by the Genoa Conference their march had been arrested". The Premier declared himself absolutely convinced that the Russians were sincere in their desire for pacification. He also confirmed the report that he is not going to the Hague conference. The message delivered to him by the Duke of Atholl was as follows. "Mr. Prime Minister I have been commanded by the King to welcome you home, in his name, and to express His Majesty's hope that your health has not suffered from your arduous and prolonged efforts in the cause of peace and the economic reconstruction of Europe". According to the Duke, the Premier was so overcome by the warmth of his welcome and the King's message that his only reply was to squeeze his hand until he made his fingers ache and say "tell him how much I thank him. Tell His Majesty how greatly I appreciate his kindness". Mr. Lloyd George looked exceedingly well.

Dublin, May 21st.—An agreement, making possible the holding of Irish elections in June and the formation of a Coalition Cabinet, was reached yesterday by the Leaders of two political factions in Southern Ireland.
