THE RED CROSS IN ST. CROIX.

What has the Red Cross done for me? What will it do for me? These are the questions that the canvasser for subscriptions most frequently meets, as she visits the homes.

Is your eyesight poor, so that you are no longer able to support yourself or your family and must either go without food or depend on charity? You can go to the hospital where the Red Cross has furnished an eye testing outfit so that your vision can be corrected.

If your new baby comes in the hospital or you take your baby to the hospital for treatment, are you not glad to know that it will have its own little white crib, furnished by the Red Cross?

If you yourself are having care in the hospital, do you know that the fresh, clean linen covering your bed was furnished by the Red Cross?

If you live in the country and are not able to visit the dispensary for treatment as the town folks are, are you not glad to avail yourself of the opportunity of care from the visiting nurse, who is able to reach all the estates at least three times a week? If she did not have the Ford car furnished by the Red Cross, she would have to rely upon a horse and buggy, with which she could reach estates only once a week and many of them not that often? You are being saved strength and money and time by her frequent visits.

Maybe you do not know that your child who is going to school, is doing poor work in school and is frail and sickly, because of bad teeth or enlarged tonsils or other physical defects. The Red Cross nurse with the doctors and dentists is visiting every school, examining every child and making possible the correction of the trouble, so that your child may grow to strong and sturdy manhood and womanhood.

The Red Cross learned of the need of libraries in the Virgin Islands and paved the way for their establishment by furnishing personnel and, together with the American Library Association, providing books.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Buenos Aires, Feb. 1st.—The Argentine Chamber of Deputies, at the opening of its new session yesterday, stood as a si-

lent tribute to Sir Ernest Shackleton, the British explorer, who died on January 5th on board the S. S. Quest in the South Atlantic. The tribute was paid after deputy Fragoni had delivered an eulogy on the dead explorer.

Dublin, Feb. 1st.—It is announced that more than 12,000 troops have already evacuated Ireland. Most of the auxiliaries have gone and the evacuation of 5,000 black and tans will begin today. The disbandment of the Royal Irish constabulary and the substitution of a popular police force is contemplated. It is probable that some of the existing forces will be reemployed to the new organization, and that the cost of compensation for the dismissed men and officers will fall on Ireland. The cost of compensating dismissed "black and tan" will fall upon England, under the provisions of the peace treaty.

Berlin, Feb. 1st.—The executive of the railway-men's union has decided to proclaim a general strike on the railways beginning at midnight. The vote was 20 to 15.

New York, Feb. 1st. Announcement that the British Isles had challenged for the Davis Cup adds a second nation to the world's tennis championship tournament for 1922. Australia has already mailed a formal challenge. From eight to 10 additional challengers are expected before the entries close on March 15th. Officials of the United States Lawn Tennis Association, as custodians of the international trophy, said today they looked for a challenge from New Zealand, which for the first time in many years will be in a position to act independently of Australia.

New York, Feb. 1st.—The early raw sugar market was steady and unchanged at 2. 1/2 cents for Cubas, cost and freight equal to 3.83. Raw sugar futures were quieter and orders were evenly divided. With prices at midday unchanged to one point higher. The market for refined sugar was unchanged at 5.00 to 5.10 for fine granulated, with only a light enquiry. There were no transactions in refined futures.

London, Feb. 1st.—A treasury white paper issued today shows the national dead weight debt for the current fiscal year totals £7,585,409,601, or a decrease of £246,334,610, as compared with the previous year. Great Britain aggregated gross liabilities, according to the paper, are £634,148,332, a decrease of £244,458,824, for the year, for prior to the war the stated gross liabilities totalled £706,654,110.

Washington, Feb. 1st.—Payment of 10,000,000 on surplus supplies purchased after the war has been made to the United States by France. The payment was the third instalment of semi-annual interest on the 400,000,000 debt created by the liquidation commission after the war, when army supplies in France were disposed of to the French Government.
