

yachtsmen. The crew of the challenger will be sent home on the first available ship.

London, July 29th.—Continued advances along virtually the whole front against the Poles are reported in Wednesday official communication from Moscow, received today by wireless.

Warsaw, July 29th.—Additional French officers attached to the military mission have arrived. All of them will be assigned to various Polish units as technical advisers. A large officers school under the supervision of French officers was opened today at Rembertoff, a suburb of Warsaw. The newspapers continue to express their contention that the Soviets do not want peace but desire to invade Poland. They say it is clear from what is transpiring in the northeast that the Bolsheviks are aiming directly at Warsaw and that in the south they are marching upon Lemberg. The Bolshevik drive is from the northeast along the Bielystok railway and thrusts in the direction of Lemberg are developing rapidly despite Polish resistance on both wings. In the centre the Poles hold Pinsk but if the Red advance continues the Poles will be compelled to evacuate the Pripiet country. The Pinsk Brest-Litovsk railway already is threatened.

London, July 29th.—Great Britain, France and Italy are in complete agreement regarding negotiations with the Russian Soviet Govt., despite statements to the contrary made by sensational and inaccurate newspapers, declared Mr. Lloyd George in the House of Commons today in replying to questions concerning the Boulogne conference. Owing to the urgency of sending an answer to the Soviet Govt. concerning the proposed peace conference, Mr. Lloyd George said that it was impossible to secure the attention of an Italian representative at Boulogne but he was kept fully informed and entirely agreed with the Allies. The Premier read the message despatched to the Soviet by Great Britain on behalf of the Allies. The message called attention to the fact that the Soviet Govt. had sent two messages which conflicted concerning the participation of the Allies in the proposed London peace conference. The first Russian message, the British communication points out, seems to reject such participation while the last message appeared to agree to it. Great Britain's message continued. "The British Govt. considered that if the Allied Govts. are to meet delegates of the Soviet Govt. with any chance of success, delegates of the Polish Govt. and other border states must also be concerned." The conference must have as its essential object the re-establishment of the peace of Europe, and in the first place, between Poland and Russia on conditions which will secure the independence of Poland and the legitimate interests of both countries. also consider questions which are still remaining between Soviet Russia and the border states, which have not yet signed a definite peace with Russia. After the settlement of these questions, the conference will deal with matters in dispute between the Govts. of Soviet Russia and the Allies and the re-establishment of normal relations between them". Questioned as to whether the Bolshevik advance against Poland had ceased, Mr. Lloyd George said he had just received a message from the British Military Mission saying the Bolshevik advance in the north had slowed down, and that it did not appear that it was being pushed with great vigour. Mr. Lloyd George said he was not sure about the situation in Galicia.

London, July 29th.—The New Zealand budget shows a surplus of two and a quarter million pounds sterling but the Premier urges that economy without parsimony is essential.

Athens, July 29th.—Colonel Jafartay, the Turkish Nationalist Commander at Adrianople, has been captured in the village of Bostanli.

San Sebastian, Spain, July 29th.—The members of the council of the league of nations arrived here at eleven this morning by special train from Paris. They held informal conferences in preparation for the opening of the full council meeting tomorrow.

London, July 29th.—A bill to deal with the disorders in Ireland will be introduced next week in the House of Commons, and passed in all its stages according to announcement by Mr. Bonar Law in the House today. Mr. Lloyd

George today received a large deputation of members of both House of Parliament on the subject of Ireland. The Premier advised the deputation to await the introduction of the new bill embodying the proposals of Sir Hamar Greenwood for dealing with the disorders. He said its provisions would be found to be very drastic and great hopes are entertained that they will succeed in coping with the situation.
