is speeding to meet the Cabinet and Parliament, has a greater interest to-night in Supreme Council circles than the work of the council itself, but it is intended that the council's work shall proceed, as far as possible, during M. Briand's absence. The council will sit tomorrow at 11 o'clock in the morning with Mr. Lloyd George presiding and M. Loucheur replacing M. Briand. In the meantime, the German delegation is meeting the reparations commission, which has asked for an answer to its previous demands for information regarding Germany's announcement that the January installment would be paid. A sub-committee this afternoon adopted the general outline of the programme for the Genoa conference. The programme begins with the comprehensive word, "Peace" following the preamble, in which it is once again strongly emphasized that the complete tranquility of Europe is essential if the Genoa conference is to amount to anything.

Paris, Jan. 11th.—M. Briand, bearing the text of the long-sought British alliance, will face the French Parliament to-morrow, which although hostile to-night, may nevertheless, in the opinion of many observers, give him a vote of confidence, because it dare not refuse a concrete pact owing to differences of opinion concerning some of the clauses and concessions. Both Senate and Chamber party, caucuses, have sent messages of protest to M. Briand and there is much talk of overthrowing the Government, as has been the case in the past years. M. Briand's supporters expect him to win.

Cannes, Jan. 11th.—Mr. George Harvey, American Ambassador to Great Britain, attended today's session of the Allied Supreme Council meeting, having almost completely recovered from the shock he suffered in an auto accident on Monday.

London, Jan. 11th.—Mr. Edgar Bundy the painter, died to-day.

London, Jan. 11th.—The summoning of the Southern Parliament to meet on Saturday by Arthur Griffith, head of the Dail Eireann and his cabinet, has started the machinery for putting the treaty into operation. Half a dozen huge vans backed in front of the Chief Secretary's office in Dublin Castle this afternoon and removed stocks and official documents and effects of the Secretariat and police department, thus beginning the evacuation of the Castle the symbol to Irishmen for centuries of British control. Eamon De Valera informed the correspondents that he believed his party would ignore the Saturday meeting of Parliament. In response to an inquiry regarding his plans, he said he intended to continue the fight for independence. He supposed elections would be held within six or nine months. Such elections, added Mr. De Valera, like the signing of the treaty in London, would be held under the British threat of renewal of warfare, and therefore he would not accept the verdict as the uncoerced will of the people. There is a big line of cleavage, said Mr. De Valera, between those standing for dependence and those for independence. Never would he, under any conditions, take the oath of allegiance contained in the treaty.

Paris, Jan. 12th.—M. Briand, who arrived here this morning to consult the Cabinet and appear before Parliament with regard to the Cannes negotiations, will speak in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon, with the full support of his cabinet behind him, it was stated after his meeting with the cabinet this forenoon. The cabinet meeting was concluded at one o'clock after a two hour session. The Premier, it was indicated, had explained the situation, with the result of removing such doubts as his colleagues have had over the situation.

Paris, Jan. 12th.—M. Aristide Briand, the Premier of France, has resigned.

Cannes, Jan. 12th.—The German delegation headed by Dr. Walter Rathenau

was received by the Allied Supreme Council this morning, the reparations commission having reported that last night's conference with the Germans had been without result.

Madrid, Jan. 12th.—Spanish forces in Morocco are approaching the Northern boundary of French territory, driving the Moorish forces before them, according to an official communication outlining Tuesday's operations.

New York, Jan. 11th.—This section was lashed today by the worst gale of the winter, a gale that at 2 p. m. reached a velocity of 90 miles an hour off Sandyhook. Usheered in with snow, that later turned to hail and rain, the storm buffeted New Yorkers without mercy, carrying many across slippery sidewalks and plunging them face-downwards in slushy streets. Several tall stacks fell before the wind, one eighty feet high toppled in Trenton N. J. A chimney 125 feet tall crashed in Brooklyn.

London, Jan. 12th.—A widespread influenza epidemic, now present in several parts of the United Kingdom, had become a normal annual event in the past year. Up to yesterday, although numerous cases have been reported, they have generally been mild, with a very small proportion of deaths. An official statement issued a week ago showed the visitation to be not more serious than that of last year, but a sudden increase of the numbers of cases in the last few days has caused the authorities to modify this view. The registrar generals report to be published today, it is understood, shows the outbreak to have reached the stage which is officially recognized as an epidemic. A large number of the cases are of so mild a nature that the sufferers treat themselves, nevertheless the number of deaths is substantially increasing. It is impossible to accurately appraise the situation until the registrar reveals the figures dealing with the deaths, but the epidemic threatens to become more serious, unless checked by a change of weather.
