TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

London, Nov. 3rd.—A remark made yesterday by Major John Jacob Astor, who said, "I am transferring my wealth

from the United States to this country", was treated as a big item of news in the morning papers, one headline reading, "Astor millions coming here". By some people, it was assumed that the Major is a brother of Viscount Astor, more referred to his recent investments in the late Lord Northcliffe's share of stock in the London Times, which he and Mr. Walter recently purchased for more than six million dollars, but others gave to the remark a more sensational turn. Major Astor, who is contesting a seat from Dover in the coming elections, made the above statement in replying to a heckler, who inquired whether he was going to expose his own wealth to British taxation.

New York, Nov. 3rd.—There is much speculation here over the reported announcement from London by Major Astor that he was transferring his wealth from the United States to England. The personal holding of the late Lord Astor in the United States totalled more than eighty million dollars, according to the referee's report issued last March in the supreme court.

London, Nov. 3rd.—The German Cabinet, according to a Central News despatch has decided to ask the reparations commission for permission to negotiate a foreign loan of five hundred million gold marks for the purpose of stabilizing the mark.

St. Johns, N. F., Nov. 3rd.—At sunrise this morning, the signal station at the entrance of this port reported the velocity of the wind at eighty miles an hour, of a storm blowing from the northeast, which shows but little sign of abating, although the glass is rising.

New York, Nov. 3rd.—The Cunard Liner "Mauretania" arrived here today, having broken the speed record between the Cherbourg breakwater and the Ambrose light, covering the distance in five days, seven hours and thirty-three minutes. This is one hour and forty-seven minutes better than the previous record, which was also held by the "Mauretania".

Paris, Nov. 3rd.—The well known French aviator, Fonck, who has just returned from a tour in South America, says that aviation will soon be the most important factor in those countries' economic life. On account of the nature of the land the lack of roads and the vast size of the agricultural estates aviation, he declared, is bound to become the usual means of travel and is already entering on its routine existence.

Athens, Nov. 3rd.—Ex-King Constantine of Greece will be charged with the responsibility for the Greek disaster in Asia Minor and will be given an opportunity to return and prove his innocence, according to the newspaper Vima. It appears almost certain, however, that he will not return.
