Signatures to Catholic Protests denounced fraudulent by supposed Signatories.

The Roman Catholic protests posted on the door of our office engaged the attention of a curious crowd all day yesterday, and gave rise to no little comment from many Catholics a number of whom erased their names declaring they had never signed the documents. Mr. Vincent Jacobs struck out his name and called upon us to protest against its having been there. He was not present at the drafting of the protests and never signed, he says. In regard to his mother's name which also appears there, he states that his mother has for some time been, and still is in Santo Domingo, and therefore could not and did not sign. Here is a splendid example of what the whole thing is worth. The protests with which these names were transmitted, not bearing the signature of anyone who may have forwarded same, it will be our opin-

ion until better informed, that this affair is a monster forgery. We are consequently very much persuaded to remove the lists as ridiculous humbugs having a tendency to insult the public.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Sept. 27th—If all German troops are not recalled from the Baltic provinces within a very short time the Allies will cut off the supplies from Germany, reestablish the blockade and interrupt the repatriation of German prisoners of war, according to the "Figaro" which states a note to this effect is being prepared by the Entente Powers in answer to a communication from the German Government which stated that forces under Genl. Von Der Goltz were being retained in the Baltic provinces because it was impossible to prepare a plan of evacuation at present.

London, Sept. 27th. The British evacuation of Archangel has been completed with the exception of two Highland regiments who will embark for Denmark, according to announcement here.

Washington, Sept. 27th.—Until a substitute for guttapercha is discovered the United States cannot lay a cable across the Pacific Ocean, unless British interest furnish the material, the Senate Committee was told yesterday by Lt. Nagle. U. S. N. The South American roduct was not as good as required, he said, the British supply comes from British owned trees in the Philippines. A representative of the Commercial Cable Company had told him that the Committee was considering the laying of a Pacific cable but Lt. Nagle said it was impossible that a private concern could lay such a cable in less than three years and that the ability of such a company to secure the material was doubtful.

London, Sept. 27th.—Adeline Pati, the Prima Donna, died this morning at Craigynos Castle Penycal, South Wales.

London, Sept. 27th. Francis Leveson Bertie, first Viscount of that name and British Ambassador to France from 1905 to 1918, died suddenly here yesterday.
