TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, June 6th.—A despatch to the "Temps" from Rome states that an agricultural strike has taken place in the province of Bari, giving rise to numerous incidents. At Spinazzola the workmen joined the peasants and declared a general strike. The Carabinieri were compelled to intervene for the rescue of a land-owner who was attacked by the strikers, and the correspondent of the "Giornale D'Italia" was killed by a gunshot by the force, not being recognized as being on the side of order. In consequence of these events, a general strike has been proclaimed in various important centres, causing collisions between the strikers and the Carabinieri.

Stockholm, June 6th.—According to the "Aften Tidningen" Premier Lenine, in the course of a discussion, emphasized the necessity for resuming foreign commercial relations, owing to the desperate situation of the Russian people.

Mayence, June 6th.—General March, Chief of the General Staff of the Amer-

ican army, will arrive on the ninth instant and will proceed to Andernach on the tenth for a review of the American troops of occupation.

Paris, June 6th.—The "Matin" states that the conference at Spa will take place only on the fifth July and that Mr. Lloyd George and M. Millerand will have a short interview at the end of June in a town on the French coast.

Berlin, June 6th.—The new electoral campaign has commenced.

Constantinople, June 6th.—The Allies in a communication to the Porte, have agreed to extend by fifteen days the time allowed for the presentation of its observations on the conditions of peace. The Porte had requested an extension of one month.

Nice, June 6th.—The American cruiser "Pittsburg", under the command of Admiral Knapp, has arrived at Villefranche.

Brussels, June 6th.—Italy has informed Belgium that the President of the Council of Ministers, the Minister of Foreign Affairs and her ambassador at Paris, will represent her at the conference at Spa.

Paris, June 6th.—The "Temps", discussing Mr. Lloyd George's doctrine, says that no allied government should make any agreement with the Bolsheviks, or adopt any policy towards them tending to prejudice the interests of the other allies, and that consequently peace must be established simultaneously on all the Russian fronts and the creditors of Russia must receive guarantees.

Berne, June 6th.—For the first time since the war a cotton congress will take place, and will be held between the ninth and eleventh instant at Zurich. Fourteen States will be represented by one hundred and thirty delegates, the principal objects of whose deliberations will be the cost of development of cultivation and assistance of the cotton industry by scientific research.

Weimar, June 6th.—Malefactors have pillaged the tombs of the poets Goethe and Schiller.

Paris, June 7th.—The "Echo de Paris" announces that President Deschanel's health continues to improve.

Paris, June 7th.—The "Journal" states that the British Cabinet is not in complete agreement relative to the attitude to be adopted towards M. Krassin, the chief of the Soviet trade delegation, and that Lord Curzon and Mr. Churchill are firmly opposed to the resumption of commercial relations.

Berlin, June 7th.—The elections are proceeding without incident and processions by the Socialists and independents have taken place in complete order. The records show about twenty-five per cent abstainers from voting. The Majority Socialists are leading at Mainz, Offenbach, Duremberg and Frankfort, the Independents have a majority at Halle and north Berlin and the Moderate Con-

servatives lead at Darmstadt, Wiesbaden and Worms.

Athens, June 7th.—M. Venizelos has left for Paris.

Constantinople, June 7th.—The committee charged with the drafting of the reply to the treaty of peace is actively pursuing its task, and the Grand Vizier expects to leave for Paris this week, taking the reply with him. An interview will take place at Paris between him and M. Venizelos.

Berlin, June 7th.—One hundred and eighty-two deputies have now been elected, as follows: Independents 48, Majority Socialists 44, Moderate Conservatives 29, Nationalist Conservatives 22, Centre Party 20, Democrats 14, Members of the Wurtemberg Peasants League 3, Guelph 1, Communist 1.

Paris, June 7th.—An international commission on agriculture sitting here, including representatives of France, the United States, Belgium, Switzerland, Holland and Denmark, has decided that Germany shall not actually participate in its deliberations, but shall be invited to attend next Spring.
