LONDON: Serious rioting broke out at Aldershot at midnight last night when two hundred Irish and cold-stream guards staged a demonstration battering the doors of the local guard-houses and demanding the release of their imprisoned comrades.

DUBLIN: Great Britain has made an open declaration of war in Ireland is the interpretation Sinn Fein leaders here today placed on the speech of Premier Lloyd-George at Carnarvon, Wales.

NAPLES: All macaroni factories in nearby towns which had been taken over by new workers have been returned to their owners. In some cases it was necessary to call out the police to effect the transfer.

CLEVELAND: Charges against Rube Marquard, port-side flinger for the Brooklyn Dodgers, arrested on the charge of ticket scalping, will not be pressed it was stated today by police officials.

SANTA CLARA, CALIFORNIA. A cyclone swept through this city today doing considerable damage to property. No one reported injured. Was the first since 1868 and lasted twenty minutes.

## TELEGRAMS.

### ST. CROIX STATION.

Tokio, Oct. 8th.—The intention of the Japanese Govt. to send additional troops to Manchuria on the Korean border has been officially announced. The troops are being despatched as quickly as possible in consequence of frequent raids by bandits who are terrorizing the population, which includes many Chinese; and the evidence received that the Chinese troops are unable to prevent the disorders.

Warsaw, Oct. 8th.—The League of Nations has sent a commission to consider the situation in connection with the fixing of the boundaries of Poland and Lithuania. Provisional frontiers have already been arranged as far as the German frontier to the confluence of the rivers Igorka and Niemen, following the route towards Uchies. The Poles and Lithuanians have been ordered to withdraw to six kilometres from the limits designated.

Warsaw, Oct. 19th.—Lithuanian insurrectionists, led by the Polish General,

Zell Gouski have occupied Vilna, the Lithuanian capital, as a protest against the decision of the Polish-Lithuanian peace delegates to include the Vilna district in Lithuanian territory. The insurgents claim that Vilna and Grondo rightly belong to Poland.

London, Oct. 10th.—Lord Curzon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has announced that the British Navy will attack all submarines encountered on the high seas. Several Bolshevik submarines are reported operating in Danzig Bay, which are menacing Polish supplies.

Paris, Oct. 10th.—The next meeting of the League of Nations, scheduled to be held at Brussels on October 14th, has been postponed to October 20th.

London, Oct. 10th.—Madrid reports state that the industrial situation at Barcelona is extremely critical. Troops and police have been reinforced. It is likely that martial law will be proclaimed. The troops are expected to remain neutral if the workers seize the factories.

Paris, Oct. 10th.—The Paris-Nantes night express was wrecked accidentally last night, and resulted in the death of forty persons and the injury of more than one hundred.

Cameron, Texas, Oct. 10th.—A fire believed to have been of incendiary origin, tonight destroyed 70,000 bales of cotton in warehouses here. The loss is estimated at \$1,000,000.

Washington, Oct. 9th.—A White House statement issued today gives the stenographer's report of the address of President Wilson at the eighth plenary session of the Paris Peace Conference, contradicting the claim of Senator Spencer that the President promised to send an American army over seas if Rumania invaded Serbia. The President denied making such a promise. The stenographic report just issued substantiates his claim.

New York, Oct. 10th.—The American steamer Abangareg, enroute from New Orleans to Havana, Kingston and Port Limon, went ashore off Kingston light-house. She was floated undamaged.

Havana, Oct. 10th.—President Menocal issued a decree last night proclaiming a moratorium effective until December 1st, following a conference of bankers and government officials regarding Cuban financial conditions.

Paris, Oct. 8th.—Germany is expected to make a new proposal regarding reparations. She will suggest rebuilding the French devastated regions by a German syndicate, free of control by the French. France is expected to refuse.

London, Oct. 10th.—The Prince of Wales arrived tonight at Spithead on board H. M. S. Renown, from his Australian trip. He made a formal landing. Tomorrow the Prince will be accorded a popular reception in London.
