Nearly \$60,000 has been given for division among the three municipal hospitals of the Virgin Islands; the public libraries have been made possible through the efforts of the Red Cross in conjunction with the American Library Association; and a school nurse to look after the health of the school children has been provided. Whether you want the Red Cross to continue its services in Saint Croix will be evidenced by your support.

The Red Cross is the largest organization in the world that has its sole object for the betterment of conditions under which humans must live. That is why it is called a humanitarian organization. TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Jan 12th.—The decision as to the deportation of Lord Mayor O'Callaghan of Cork, who arrived in Newport News last week as a stowaway without a passport, was referred yesterday to President Wilson. President Wilson's advice was sought at yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet. The President thus was called upon to decide the position of Acting Secretary Davis of the State Department, who has insisted on the exclusion of the Lord Mayor from the United States for attempting to enter without a passport, and that of Secretary of Labour, Wilson, who has refused to acknowledge jurisdiction of the State Department until the case has been formally presented to it by the Labour Department.

Ottawa, Jan. 12th.—Following a conference between Mr. Carvell, Chairman, and other members of the Railway Commission and representatives of the Canadian Railways, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and other bodies, it was announced today that a solution had been found to the exchange problem as applied to international freight rates. Commissioner Carvell said that he was unable to make a definite announcement of the new arrangement, because it must be ratified by the Interstate Commerce Commission of the United States. He said, however, that it amounted to a plan whereby the Canadian shipper pays the Canadian portion of the haul in funds of the Dominion of Canada, while the remainder is paid at the American rate.

London, January 12th.—The last information as to the reorganization of the Colonial Office which will be carried out before Viscount Milner leaves, is that two departments will be formed under one ministerial chief, one of these will deal with overseas dominions affairs and the other with those pertaining to the middle east and the Crown Colonies.

London, January 12th.—Ellis Powell, editor of the "Financial News", speaking on Canada before the Colonial Institute expressed the conviction that Canada and not the United States was destined to dominate the future of the whole North American continent, because she would overcome her climatic difficulties and her sparseness of population and become the focus of the empire.

Washington, January 12th.—A bill proposing federal regulation for the coal industry in the United States and empowering the President to fix prices and profits in case of emergency or shortage, was introduced today by Chairman Calder of the Senate Committee investigating the 1920 coal shortage.

New York, January 12th.—A general rounding up of all oriental ineligible in the United States will be launched on Jan. 22nd. This announcement was
