TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Dec. 8th.—According to a Reuter cable from Melbourne, the Australian House of Representatives has passed a bill authorizing the raising of a loan of 10,000,000 pounds for the purpose of re-establishing soldiers and for land settlement work. A bill has been passed extending preferential tariff treatment to New Zealand.

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 8th.—The Executive Committee of the Federation recently organized, today sent the following cable message to Mr. De Valera: "Congratulations on the steady progress towards independence. We shall stand by the decision of the Dail Eireann."

Ottawa, Dec. 8th.—Arrangements were completed today for a public reception to Marshal Foch, Generalissimo of the Allied armies in the great war,

and Genl. Pershing, Commander in Chief of the American Expeditionary force, both of whom will arrive in the capital Sunday morning, accompanied by their staffs; Marshal Foch and Genl Pershing will be officially welcomed to Canada, their arrival in Ottawa being their first point of visit in the dominion. They will be met by His Excellency Lord Byng of Viny, Governor General of Canada and a military reception will follow.

Dublin, Dec. 9th.—The Freeman's Journal says that apart from the general satisfaction in the agreement which the men who represented Ireland in the conference declare is general in the South, the release yesterday of a large number of Republicans, interned for political offences, produced a strong feeling of goodwill toward Britain. Mr. De Valera has also lost much of his influence. The best opinion is that the split among the Dail Eireann leaders will not affect the plans for the opening of Parliament. The agreement was made between the Government and Plenipotentiaries representing the Dail Eireann, and will be placed before the House as such an agreement in the King's speech. Then a brief adjournment will be taken to await the vote of the Dail Eireann, which meets the same day, next Wednesday.

Amoy, China, Dec. 9th.—An immense demonstration in protest against the proposed settlement of the Shantung question took place here today. Thousands of persons marched through the streets of the city. Shops and schools were closed.

Washington, Dec. 9th.—Great Britain, Japan, the United States and France have agreed in principle to the four Power treaty proposed as a substitute for the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

Dublin, Dec. 9th.—Commenting on the statement of Mr. De Valera, in which the Republican leader declared himself in opposition to the terms of the Irish agreement, the Irish Independent today says. In connection with this development, the outstanding fact is that on September 14th last, the Dail Eireann appointed five plenipotentiaries to represent Ireland at a conference with representatives of the British Government, to discuss the Anglo-Irish problem and if possible arrive at a settlement. With skill and ability these plenipotentiaries fulfilled the onerous mission entrusted to them. After long weeks of arduous labour and persistent effort they secured terms and a settlement, which, we have no doubt, were the best that in existing conditions could have been extracted. As Plenipotentiaries they represented the Dail Eireann and the Irish nation and in the exercise of their power they signed a treaty of peace. We submit that in the circumstances the nation is in honour bound to uphold their action."
