

Princeton, Nov. 19th.—By the narrow margin of a field goal kicked by Smith, of Princeton, and the resultant three points, Princeton defeated Yale here yesterday afternoon in the annual football match.

Berlin, Nov. 19th.—The weekly result of the Reichsbank shows a record increase in currency during the second week in November, when sixty-five billion marks of new money was put in circulation.

London, Nov. 19th.—The new Parliament, which assembles tomorrow, will possess one novelty, as it will be the first Parliament in which the Labour party has attained dimensions entitling it to be recognized as the official opposition, with certain prescriptive privileges in the amenities of the House attached to that position. There are three possible claimants for the position of leader of the opposition, namely, Mr. Asquith, Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Clynes, supposing the latter, as expected is reelected Chairman of the official opposition, as the Labour party far outweighs in strength either the Asquith or Lloyd George parties. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday will be occupied in the formalities of electing a new speaker and the swearing in of new members. Mr. T. P. O'Connor, as father of the House, will propose the reelection of the present speaker, Mr. Whitley and his motion is expected to be carried unanimously. The formal opening of Parliament by the King will take place on Thursday when His Majesty will deliver a brief speech, in which he will announce the assembling of a new Parliament and intimate that its principal business will be the ratification of the Irish Constitution, which must be accomplished by December 6th, otherwise the Anglo-Irish treaty will lapse. For this reason, much less time than usual will be occupied in debate on the address in reply to the King's speech and Parliament will adjourn early in December, to re-assemble in February, when the real business of legislation will begin.

Constantinople, Nov. 19th.—The Crown Prince Abdul Medjid Effendi, cousin of the Sultan Mohammed Sixth, was elected Caliph by the Great National Assembly of Turkey on Saturday and will be inducted into office tomorrow. Angora will probably be the seat of the Caliphate until the foreign occupation of Constantinople ceases. Abdul Medjid Effendi was born in 1833. He received 148 votes out of a total of 163 cast. The new Caliph telegraphed his acceptance, reserving certain limited temporal powers. He is a son of the Sultan Abdul Aziz and is described as interested in letters and literature, a patron of the arts and an accomplished painter and composer of music. He has always been identified with the Nationalist movement and is credited with possessing a strong will. His friends say he will not be content

to remain merely as the religious head of Islam, but will insist upon exercising temporal powers. Unlike most Turks, he has only one wife and lives modestly and quietly, not mixing in politics.

London, Nov. 20th.—According to rumours from Dublin, published in the Evening News, Mr. Erskine Childers, one of the chief assistants of Mr. De Valera, has been executed, together with eight other men, whose names are not given. He was recently tried before a military court on a charge of bearing arms illegally.

Havana, Nov. 20th.—The delegate from Panama replied to the official address of welcome at the first session of the Latin American Medical Congress, which opened here today in this city. The addresses, which were broadcasted by radio, were able to be heard within a radius of three thousand miles.

Constantinople, Nov. 20th.—Rafet Pasha, the Governor, may be dismissed from his office on account of his failure to prevent the escape of the Sultan. According to the associated Press correspondents Rafet declared that while the Nationalists did not attach much importance to the charge they nevertheless denounced Great Britain's complicity in the matter, describing it as a flagrant interference in Turkish affairs.

Washington, Nov. 20th.—A special session of Congress was convened today, to last a fortnight, in order to discuss the administration ship subsidy bill. Tomorrow, it is expected, the President will address a joint session.

Lausanne, Nov. 20th.—M. Poincare, Lord Curzon and Premier Mussolini resumed their preliminary conference this morning. The President of Switzerland read an address to which Lord Curzon replied. The first to arrive were M. Venizelos and Premier Mussolini, followed by M. Poincare, and then immediately after by Lord Curzon and M. Barrere. The conference will meet again tomorrow evening.

Hong Kong, Nov. 20th.—While en route from this port to Macao, a British steamer was seized by a band of Chinese pirates, travelling as passengers. They held the ship for thirteen hours, but were finally driven overboard by the crew and passengers after a fierce fight in which several casualties occurred, including the captain of the steamer, a French priest and a European passenger.

London, Nov. 20th.—In a message to Rafet Pasha, the Nationalist Governor of Constantinople, the Angora Government expresses its inability to understand the reason for the Sultan's flight, inasmuch as the great National assembly of Turkey, when voting for the abolition of his temporal power, continued to recognize him, as Caliph, until the election of his successor, and Angora, as outlined in a despatch from Constantinople, has instructed Rafet to supply the details

of his flight. A Reuter's despatch from Constantinople, says that the Allied High Commissioner, on receiving assurance from the Turkish Government at Constantinople that it would see that the newspapers refrained from publishing anything which might work against the safety of the Allied troops and of public order, unanimously decided to abolish the censorship, beginning November 18th.

Dublin, Nov. 20th.—The city is suffering from an acute attack of nerves, partly owing to Mr. De Valera's threat of reprisals, if Mr. Erskine Childers, convicted of carrying arms, is executed.

London, November, 20th.—The King's speech at the formal opening of Parliament on Thursday, it is understood, will begin with an important reference to Foreign Affairs, followed by an allusion to unemployment at home, as connected with the unsettled conditions of Europe. Legislation establishing the new constitution of Ireland will be mentioned, however, as the sole matter, which necessitated the meeting of Parliament for the second time this year, and the House will be invited to pass upon it without delay. The official view is that ten working days should suffice for the debate on the reply to the speech from the Throne and the passage of the Irish Bill, but it is regarded as somewhat doubtful, if the Govt's programme for a very short session can be strictly adhered to. Contrary to the usual experience after a general election, the Opposition, as represented by the augmented Labour Party, is in high spirits over the reinforcement of its number and is not likely to forego, willingly, the opportunities the debate will offer. An amendment, raising the problem of unemployment and other Labour proposals on this subject, is expected, with a press campaign by the Govt. and other amendments may be moved, while the benches will be crowded with young members from the North eager to address the House on matters in which they are clearly interested. Mr. Smilie, President of the Scottish Mines Union, however told his executive committee at Glasgow today that although Labour is now about 150 strong they must not expect a millennium in the next few months, but they might look for a vast improvement in conditions for the workers. The two Liberal parties will also be active and it may be necessary to offer special days for the debate after the Irish business is transacted. Asked whether Mr. Newbold, the solitary Communist in the new Parliament, would take the oath of allegiance to the King, the Communist Party's Parliamentary Secretary admitted that the oath did not accord with the principles of the Party, but added that "as a matter of expediency," no practical difficulty was anticipated.

Constantinople, Nov. 20th.—The investiture of Abdul Medjid Effendi, as Caliph, will take place to-morrow.
