ST. CROIX STATION.

Indianapolis, Oct. 27th.—A suitable reply to President Wilson's statement holding the coal miner's strike to be not only unjustifiable but unlawful, will probably be drawn up at the meeting of the Executive Board of the United Mine Workers of America to be held here on Wednesday, according to a statement today by W. Green, Secretary and Treasurer of the United Mine Workers. Mr Green declined to comment on the President's statement pending such action as the Board may take further than to say that it is an impossibility now to rescind the strike order effective November 1st.

Washington, Oct. 27th.—An early closing of the contract for the purchase by the United States Navy Dept. of the British rigid airship R38, the largest airship in the world, now under

construction in England, is expected, it was stated today. Two and a half million dollars were appropriated by Congress for the purchase of this airship for the training of the pilots. The British Ministry has offered to train the personnel for the R38 so that upon delivery the airship can be taken over by an American crew and be flown to the United States.

Putney, Oct. 27th.—Alfred Felton, of Australia, today defeated Ernest Barry, for many years sculling champion, for the sculling championship of the world.

New York, Oct. 26th.—Willie Hoppe defeated Jase Schaffer in the final match tonight of the professional 18.2 Balk Line National Championship Billiard Tournament by a score of 400, to 214 this left Hoppe a perfect record for the tournament with six victories and no defeats. His grand average for all the games was 47.5.

Washington, Oct. 27th.—The Johnson amendment to the Peace Treaty proposing in effect that the voting power of the United States in the League of Nations be increased to equal that of Great Britain and her Dominions, was rejected today by the Senate. The Vote was 38 for the amendment 40 against it.

Toronto, Oct. 27th.—Fifteen subscriptions make the total of \$65,250,000 announced as the first day's work of the Victory Loan. The Canada Assurance Co. and the Sun Life Assurance Co. made a subscription of \$15,000,000, each, Manufacturers Life, \$5,000,000, Confederation Life \$4,000,000 North American Life \$2,000,000 and Imperial Oil Co. \$3,000,000.

Demerara, Oct. 28th. At a meeting yesterday in the Town Hall, attended by representative audience and speaker in connection with a proposal by Lord Rothermere that British Guiana with some West Indian Islands be ceded to the United States in liquidating Great Britain's debts to the former. A resolution was unanimously passed denouncing the proposition.

Viborg, Oct. 27th.—Reports were received today that a naval battle occurred off Kronstadt yesterday. The reports which were unconfirmed, gave no details. While passing the island of Bjorko off the Swedish coast yesterday, the Associated Press correspondent saw the British monitor Erenbus and several destroyers putting to sea.

Washington, Oct. 27th.—President Wilson unexpectedly vetoed the prohibition re-enforcement bill today and within three hours the House had repassed it over his veto by a vote of 176 to 55. The total vote was barely more than a majority of the entire membership. Dry leaders in the Senate immediately started laying plans to repass the Bill there. They expect to ask unanimous consent for its consideration tomorrow, claiming enough votes to put it through, they expect to action it by Wednesday at the latest. The President refused to sign
