Catania, June 18th.—Mount Etna is active today. Several eruptions of the volcano during the night were heralded by loud explosions, followed by streams of lava that overrun a number of cultivated fields and woods. The station at Castiglione has been destroyed and the railway near the mountain obstructed, while a lava stream 300 metres wide threatens the district about Linguaglossa. Besides the eruption from the main crater numerous small craters have opened on the side of the mountain. The eruptive activity of the volcano is accompanied by violent explosions and tremendous discharges of ashes and cinders, with lava constantly flowing down the sides of the mountain. Slight earthquakes are adding terror to the situation.

London, June 10th.—Captain Swan, Paymaster of the British gendarmes in Palestine, was murdered last Friday while travelling between Ramleh and Jaffa, says a Jerusalem despatch to the Daily Mail. His assailants escaped. Several other acts of brigandage have occurred in the district in the last few days.

Jerusalem, June 18th.—The Government officially announces that all but one of the 20 bandits, participating in the recent attack on the company of gendarmes, escorting the High Commissioner, Sir Herbert Samuel, which resulted in the death of five of the British, have been captured.

Limerick, June 18th.—Addressing a large gathering here yesterday, President Cosgrave said that Ireland had taken the first of its forward steps in its new sphere in the nationhood of the

world. While the Government was willing to forget the trouble of the last twelve months, it would take no risks regarding the established sovereignty of the people. If there is a threat of war we shall meet it, he declared. We regret the action of the Northern Government in remaining outside the Free State we want a united Ireland and brotherhood cooperation from all.

New York, June 18th.—The early raw sugar market was unsettled today. Buyers opening 34 points lower, to ten points net higher, a steadier feeling prevailed and at midday prices were unchanged, to 16 points net higher. The weakness was confined to the near positions and was due to renewed liquidation and selling for Japanese account. After the early selling had subsided, prices rallied on heavy covering and trade buying. There was no change in refined sugar, with fine granulated listed at 9 25. Only a moderate business was reported.

Christiania, June 18th.—Captain Amundsen has abandoned his North Pole flight, it was announced today by the Minister of Defence.

Essen, June 18th.—The French have seized 170 locomotives and 2,000 goods truck on branch lines between Dortmund and Essen, thus virtually completing French control of the Ruhr transportation lines.

Quebec, June 18th.—The forest fire situation has greatly improved within the last 24 hours, according to reports received from all over the provinces.

Ottawa, June 18th.—Clause five of the Bank Act, which provides for extending the charters of Canadian banks for a period of ten years, was sent to the committee of the House of Commons shortly before 2 o'clock this morning. The clause was adopted, following the defeat of the Progressive amendment to limit

the extensions to one year, by a vote of 65 to 67. The progressives present voted solidly in favour of the amendment.

New York, June 18th.—Pancho Villa, of the Philippines, knocked out Jimmie Wilde of England, the world's flyweight champion, in the seventh round of a fifteen round match tonight with a right to the jaw.

Washington, June 18th.—The Government has accomplished the task of living within its income in the past twelve months and has accumulated a surplus of two hundred million dollars in addition, the President said today in a speech at a meeting of department heads and bureau and division chiefs constituting the Government's business organization. Further reductions, he said, would be made in expenditures in the coming year. The record, the President said, is more important since the fiscal year was inaugurated last July 1st, with a deficit confronting the Treasury of \$823,000,000. To this, "signal achievement", Mr. Harding declared, should be added to the fact, that, in addition to wiping out the deficit and accumulating a surplus, the campaign for efficiency and economy had resulted in actual expenditures of the Government being cut 256,000,000 in the last 12 months below the ordinary expenditures for the year ending last June 30th.

London, June 18th.—English pacifists and a section of the labour party are protesting against the launching of the XI, the new mystery submarine, which cost four million pounds, without her armament. The vessel is reported to have a cruising radius of 8,000 miles. She was laid down prior to the Washington Disarmament Conference and is therefore exempt from the restrictions imposed by the pact. Mr. Ramsay MacDonald opposed the launching of the vessel in a speech at Hampton on Sunday, saying, "It seems that the world is rattling back to barbarism".

Withington, Lanes, June 18th.—Eduardo Flaquer and Count Degomar, representing Spain, today won the match in the doubles in the Davis Cup from the British pair, Randolph Lycett, and L. A. Godfree. Today's play sent the Spaniards into the lead in the competition, two matches to one, Degomar having won in the singles over W. Hendy last Saturday. Spain's loss in the competition thus far was when Flaquer lost to Lycett in the singles on Saturday. Today the court was slippery which worked to the advantage of the Spaniards. They cleverly drew up the British players to the net and then lobbed the ball over their heads. After two sets the Englishmen adopted a baseline game with advantage. The perfect combination of the Spaniards, however, enabled them to outplay their opponents. Lycett was steady, but Godfree frequently sent the ball into the net, or lobbed inaccurately. The score was 7-2, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3.
