A meeting will be held on Monday at the headquarters of the Red Cross in Christiansted, for the purpose of reorganizing the work which it is contemplated to carry on for local benefit, along lines that will reach the poor and needy in our own midst.

We are told that the "Virginia" arrived in Frederiksted this morning with 40 sacks etc of United States and other mails, the Christiansted portion of which may be looked for by the regular mail-car this 4 p. m.

Sanitation Question.

Several persons have called our attention to an article in West End News of 21st. instant dealing with sanitary affairs in the island, and pointing out that the new sanitary measures are largely a burden to most persons, especially those of small means who are unable to comply with the demands for making various repairs and changes on their properties, as approved by the Sanitary Department. The paper satirically refers to the erecting, constructing and re-constructing, etc. which are enough to distract people and have forced poor owners of houses into contracting debt which they had no prospect of paying, it being their only resort, unless they must sell the small house and lot which are their only shelter, and go out and beg. West End News suggests that if these sanitary measures are indispensable, they might be executed at public expense where the parties called upon to effect them were pecuniarily unable to do so. Says W. E. N., if the prisoners are too busy cutting wood or burning coal, then perhaps others can be found who could do the sanitary jobs in such cases, and it would at any rate eliminate distress from many if something in this line were put in practice.

The sanitation question like many other public questions in which we cannot but consider that the people should have a voice, is a ticklish one. Motives are not easily understood around here, and as soon any matter is commented upon somebody is sure to be displeased, or such criticism as may be advanced is sure to be construed as lack of appreciation for what is intended. In many instances where articles have been contributed to this paper, the ire of those not siding with the views expressed, has been aroused and in one or two cases we have been taken to account for publishing perfectly wholesome matter, just because the ideas conveyed did not dovetail with some partisan critic's opinions. It will therefore readily be seen that where people are too narrow-minded to entertain or tolerate any views that differ from theirs, but
