TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, August 1st.—Alex. Cross of Montreal, ex-Member of the Dominion Parliament, yesterday challenged for the America's Cup, according to the New York "World". It called for a Canadian-built yacht to come to New York in July of next year. His challenge supersedes the intended one of Sir Thomas Lipton for another race in 1922.

Quebec, Aug. 1st.—The Imperial Press Conference spent the day in Quebec today in rest and recreation preparatory to the official programme of civic entertainment tomorrow. A dinner in the Chateau Frontenac tonight was in honour of the Captain and Officers of the Steamship Victorian, on which the Press Party crossed the Atlantic. The Overseas Delegates were the hosts at this function.

St. John, July 30th.—Lord Burnham and the other Imperial Press Delegates left Nova Scotia last night tremendously impressed with their visit. At Sydney, Halifax, Kentville, Wolfville, Grand Pre and Truro they have been entertained with delightful hospitality and have realized fully their opportunity of informing themselves with regard to the beauty and commercial, agricultural and industrial advantages of the Atlantic Province. Lord Burnham yesterday afternoon made strong representations to railway officials, urging particularly the value of a campaign to induce the immigration to Nova Scotia of British officers now relieved from Army Service. He was sure that Nova Scotia now provided for this class of men, an opportunity unequalled in Canada. He was full of enthusiasm over his motor trip through

the Cornwallis valley today. Never before, he said, has he seen such evidence of agricultural prosperity in such beautiful surroundings. It was a place that would appeal strongly to the British officer class, and its proximity to the sea would be an additional attraction to those coming from the British Isles.

Fredericton, July 31st.—Running slightly ahead of their schedule, the two De Luxe special trains furnished by C. P. R. and the C. N. R. arrived here shortly before noon today with the Overseas Delegates to the Imperial Press Conference. The C. P. R. Special was the first to arrive, being followed about half an hour later by the C. N. R. train. "We must meet and we must meet again", said Sir Campbell Sturat, Vice Chairman of the "Times" Publishing Co. and Editor of the London "Daily Mail", addressing the civic gathering which welcomed the Imperial Press Conference in Fredericton today. Sir Campbell spoke of the Imperial Council which must some day rule the destinies of the British Empire, a Council in which the sons of the Empire will sit with Mother England in her hours of decision, not intermittently but permanently, no matter where the geographical headquarters may be. This was the lesson taught by the war, which had found Canada a province and left her a nation. "The League", he said, "That great legacy of the war, is trying to be seen in the shadow and to be more than a voice in the wilderness, and meantime a new force has come into the world, full of virility and animated by the highest ideals, the force that is called the League of Nations of the British Empire under whose common flag, please God, may we all live and die".

London, Aug. 2nd.—A continuance of the Bolshevik advance west of Bialystok, with the occupation of towns and villages, is reported in yesterday communication from the Russian War Office at Moscow received here.
