An Open Letter

13 January, 1922.

Honorable C. C. Thiele,
Chairman of the Colonial Council,
of St. Thomas and St. John,
St. Thomas, V. I.

My dear Judge Thiele:

Allow me to congratulate you and the other members of the Colonial Council of St. Thomas and St. John upon the passage of the tax law. You have accomplished a great work for your community.

I fully realize that this new law conceived along American lines and generally similar to the laws of other American communities, was a new, big and unaccustomed step for the islands to take. It is but natural to shrink from new paths that seemingly lead to ends beyond our own personal experiences; but the members of the Colonial Council did not shrink from their duty. They squarely and honestly faced it and patiently studied the problem from all aspects, until finally convinced of its merit and necessity, they have enacted the law.

Your fine work is a source of great gratification to me and I feel sure that the President and the Congress at home will be greatly pleased.
