## TELEGRAMS.

### ST. CROIX STATION.

Ottawa, Sept. 17th.—Canadian doctors are being sought for service in East and West Africa. A letter addressed to the Governor General, asks as to the number of young Canadians who would be likely to accept service under the Colonial Office and for particulars concerning them. If sufficient candidates were available, the letter states, a senior medical officer of the Colonial Office would be sent to Canada to interview the candidates and report as to their suitability.

Winnipeg, Sept. 18th.—More than 10,000,000 barrels of flour will be sent to foreign countries by Canada this year. The capacity of Canada's 720 flour mills is 142,642 barrels a day. Back in 1876 when the Hudson Bay Co. which is closing out its remaining lands to colonists erected a mill with a capacity of 1,350 pound a day it was the marvel of the western agricultural world. Today even the smallest of the mills have a 100 barrels a day capacity.

London, Sept. 18th.—A time bomb was exploded at the Stock Exchange in Genoa yesterday, says a despatch from Genoa. Some damage was done but there were no casualties. The authors of the outrage were not apprehended.

Montreal, Sept. 17th.—A Paris cable to the "Montreal Star" says the "Echo de Paris", said the Government had instructed the representative to the League of Nations Council, M. Bourgeois, that France will withdraw from the League if Germany is admitted at the forthcoming conference at Geneva.

London, Sept. 18th.—A strike of print-

ers in Manchester and Liverpool was provisionally settled today. The newspapers are expected to reappear on Monday.

Philadelphia, Sept. 17th. The Incognito Cricket Team of cricketers led the All Philadelphia eleven 219 runs to 86 at the close of the first day of their three days match at the Germantown cricket club. The first innings of each side had been completed when stumps were drawn.

Chicago, Sept. 17th. A cordon of police was thrown around Chicago Stock Exchange, Board of Trade and other buildings in the financial district by Chief of Police Garrity yesterday afternoon in an effort to prevent a possible repetition of the New York explosion.

Nome, Alaska, Sept. 17th.—Captain Amundsen's expedition ship the "Maud" which left this port nearly two months ago bound for the North Pole is caught in the ice about 20 miles off Cape Serz on the Siberian coast, according to information brought here yesterday by a fishing boat which was also ice-bound near the "Maud". The captain said his vessel being of light draft, worked its way out after being ice-bound near the "Maud" for ten days, but that Captain Amundsen hoped to free the Maud soon and continue his journey.
