ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Paris, May 11th.—The cabinet at a meeting today instructed the Minister of Justice to open proceedings against the mineral federation of labour, with a view to the dissolution of the organization, which has been supporting the strike of the railway men by calling other strikes.

Washington, May 11th.—The organization by Great Britain, France, Japan and the United States of an international consortium to provide loans for China has been officially announced by the State Dept. The announcement said it was expected to provide for a credit fund adequate enough to permit that country to proceed with its economic and industrial development, much of which was suspended during the war.

London, May 11th.—Major Christopher Lowther, coalition Unionist, asked in the House of Commons yesterday whether the Government's attention had been called to a report that the United States had seized the island of Taboga, which is the property of the Republic of Panama, for the purpose of erecting fortifications, and whether, in view of Great Britain's desire to protect the rights of the smaller nationalities, a protest had been made to the United States, and further, whether the matter could be referred to the League of Nations. The Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in replying, described the proposal of the United States in 1908 regarding the defences for the purpose of protecting the entrance to the Canal and America's

Major Lowther asked why it was that Great Britain had objected to the French occupying Frankfurt and did not protest when the United States occupied an island belonging to a small nationality. Mr. Bonar Law, the Government Leader, replying said, "There is no analogy as regards Germany, we acted together and our objection was to any of our allies acting separately".

Electro, California, May 10th.—Captain Lowell Smith broke what is said to be the world's altitude record for an airplane carrying a pilot and three passengers yesterday, when he ascended seventeen thousand one hundred feet. The airplane was in the air two hours and forty minutes.

Rome, May 10th.—The ministry of which Premier Nitti was the head has resigned.

Kingston, Jamaica, May 11th.—A reso-

lution has been adopted by a certain section here accepting the Government's proposal for state control of the liquor traffic. The exportation from Jamaica is on the increase and investigators have so far been unable to ascertain where it is going.

Kingston, Jamaica, May 12th.—The Swettenham cup was shot for yesterday and resulted in a total of 743. Murray scored 100.

Trinidad, 11th.—A party of Venezuelans on Sunday last chartered a local motor launch to proceed to Guapo on the south coast of this island. On arriving near the asphalt lake the crew was ordered to proceed to the Venezuelan coast and upon refusing to do so the owner and engineer were both shot dead, the rest of the crew escaped by jumping into the sea. Local forces and H. M. S. "Calliope" are searching the Gulf of Paria for the launch and pirates, so far without success. It is presumed the pirates have already landed on the Venezuelan coast.
