LOCAL

The S. S. "Marina" arrived here on Saturday afternoon at 1:30, landed 66 sacks mail for this place, some passengers and cargo and sailed for Frederiksted on the usual schedule.

The races at Mannings Bay yesterday were the most important attraction for Easter and were largely attended as usual. The 1st, 2nd, 5th and 7th races were won by the horses of Concordia Stables, on which success we have to congratulate our live sportsman Mr. H. McKay through whose efforts and liberal activity, this popular pastime of St. Croix has been revived and maintained. The 3rd race was won by Mr. E. Brown's "Sparkle" and the 6th by the famous O'Girl of Mr. S. Hodge one of the leading sportsmen of Frederiksted, who, however, was not attended with his customary successes yesterday. On the whole a very enjoyable day was afforded and while the pocketbooks of many were depleted by reckless betting, many also were replenished and everybody is looking forward to another such day of public entertainment. Music was furnished by the Frederiksted Century Brass Band.

The theatre was crowded last night when the last six thundering reels of "The Flaming Disk" were presented. There was screened a slide promising a complete drama featuring Marie Walcamp in 6 reels on Thursday night. Look out for programme.

Many visitors from St. Thomas spent Easter here arriving on the schooners

"Zurah" and "Fancy Me" and rearing this morning.

Baseball and football matches played between the Stars of St. Thomas and the Marine club, and the Dreadnought Football club resulted in pronounced victories for the home players.

A program of sacred selections was splendidly rendered by the Native Brass Band here on Sunday evening. It was a great treat.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, April 10th.—The rumour of the deposition of Mr. De Valera, as leader of the Republican party, is officially denied by the headquarters of the Irish insurgents. It is reported that actual fighting has occurred between the adherents of the Free State and the insurgents.

New Orleans, April 10th.—A serious fire, which occurred here last night, partially destroyed the Elks Home. Among the casualties reported were two persons, occupants of the building, buried beneath the ruins and killed while seventeen firemen received injuries.

Dallas, Texas, April 10th.—Tornadoes of great severity are being experienced in sections of Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma, by which seventeen persons have lost their lives and eighty have been injured.

Washington, April 10th.—The work on the bill for a permanent tariff is practically finished, the Republican members of the finance committee of the Senate having agreed to accept foreign valuation therein. The bill will be reported on today or tomorrow.

Geneva, April 10th.—The Plenipotentiaries of Columbia and Venezuela have signed the arbitration decision recently rendered by the Swiss Federal Council regarding the question of the frontier between those two countries. A commission of Swiss experts will shortly visit the territory under litigation.

New York, April 10th.—Former Governor Cox, in a statement yesterday, attributed the present disturbed conditions to the refusal of the United States to enter the society of nations and he recommended a continuation of the campaign in favour of her entry.

Le Louviere, Belgium, April 10th.—At a meeting of the industrial association of central Belgium, M. Loucheur declared that the substitution of new money for the depreciated moneys of Germany and other countries was the only hope of reorganizing the financial situation, and that money should be based not on a gold standard, but on its actual purchasing value in a country.

Geneva, April 10th.—Ex-Empress Zita has expressed a desire to reside with her children at the Chateau of Wartegg, be-
