

REGULATIONS

Governing The Export Of Cattle.

EXPORT License can, as a rule, be expected as long as the live stock of the island is not thereby, in the opinion of the Food Commission, reduced to such an extent as to cause a rise in the existing prices of Milk or Meat, fixed by the Food Commission for local consumption, or shortage of said products for local consumption. Export licenses will only be granted by the Commission on the basis of stocks owned by the applicant, for which reason the intended exporter must, in his application, mention the number of cattle held by him at the time of applying; also the number of cattle already exported by him during the present calendar year.

The Export License will moreover be made conditional on the applicant's declaring himself willing to place a similar number of head of cattle of corresponding size at the disposal of the Food Commission, should occasion require it, at the prices fixed by the Food Commission for local consumption, at the time the export license is granted, which condition will attach as a lien on the stock if sold locally for other purpose than butchering for local consumption.

Licenses for exportation of cattle expire fourteen days after date issue.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Philadelphia Feby. 23rd.—Mr. Henry Morgenthau, former United States Ambassador to Turkey, in an address at a mass meeting, under the auspices of the Near East Relief Society, held here yesterday, declared that the Turks should be driven from Europe and urged the American people to make a strong protest against the outrages which, he said, have taken place and continue in the Near East. The British and French, for selfish purposes, he declared, are arranging to let the Turks remain in Constantinople and if the Turk is permitted to keep control of the police and judicial systems, the Greeks, Syrians, Armenians and Jews cannot call their lives their own.

Constantinople, Feby. 23rd.—The despatches announcing that the London Conference had agreed to the principle of maintaining the Turkish Sovereignty in Constantinople was hailed joyfully by the entire Turkish Press and officialdom, which declare that the retention of Con-
