he emphasized the fact that his policy was one of negotiations.

Manilla, Nov. 2nd.—Except for two warships at Vladivostok and some gunboats in Chinese waters, the entire United States Asiatic fleet is gathering here, the last vessels being due to reach Manilla Bay the fourth instant.

Chicago, Nov. 2nd.—Mr. Boyce, the well-known publisher, has announced that the expedition, which he has planned for the circumnavigation of Africa would soon start. Africa was, he claims, the underlying cause of the great war.

Bristol, England, Nov. 3rd.—In the course of an address delivered here Lord Birkenhead recounted an incident which occurred at the signing of the Irish peace treaty, and, which he said, in view of Mr. Collins' death, must be given a place in history. On that last fatal night, said Lord Birkenhead, when at one o'clock in the morning we affixed our signatures to that memorable document, we were talking about the difficulties which confronted us and I knew well what the effects would be upon the minds of many of my own political friends of what I thought it my duty to do. Believe me, I was under no illusions as to its consequences and I said to Mr. Collins, "I may well have signed my political death warrant tonight", and he used in reply this poignant and pathetic expression "I may well have signed my actual death warrant in putting my signature to this document".

London, Nov. 3rd. — (Associated press.) The suspense over the result of the elections will be over quickly as compared with the old pre-war days. All ballots will be counted this time on one day, November 15th., and almost the entire membership of the new Parliament will be known before the night of the sixteenth.

Constantinople, Nov. 3rd.—Associated press. The Turkish nationalists Government at Angora has passed sentences of death upon the Turkish signatories of the Sevres treaty and the Cabinet of the former Premier Demad Ferid Pasha who it accuses of being anglophile. Hadi Pasha, who with Riza Tewfik Bey, signed the Sevres treaty has left Constantinople for Switzerland, which is also the refuge of Demad Ferid Pasha.

Panama, Nov. 3rd.—The number of ships passing through the Panama Canal during October numbered 313, a new high record.

London, Nov. 3rd.—The attention of the political world is absorbed in the result of the municipal elections in which labour suffered a overwhelming defeat. The returns from seventy of the leading boroughs in the provinces show that out of 574 labour candidates, only 315 were elected, while the Conservatives elected 350 of the 450 nominated in London, where there has been a similar landslide. Labour had 753 seats on the old councils.

but has only 253 on the new. Labour now holds only four London Borough Councils, namely, Battersea, Bermondsey, Poplar and Woolwich, as against twelve councils formerly held, while in eleven London Boroughs, not a single labour representative was returned.

Angora, November 3rd.—The Nationalist Government at Angora announces that it considers null and void, all treaties and conventions concluded since March 16th 1920 by the Constantinople administration.

Constantinople, November 3rd.—The Angora Assembly last night decided unanimously that it is invested with sovereignty rights and that the National Government is the keystone of the Caliphate and today's newspapers carry the headlines, "The Ottoman Empire has collapsed and in its place there has arisen a new Turkish State with the Sultanate abolished". This decision of the Assembly was announced by a salute of ten guns and immediately soldiers and civilians began to celebrate the occasion to the blare of military bands and the bright flare of torchbearers.

Constantinople, Nov. 3rd.—Lieutenant Sir Charles Harington, Commander of the Allied forces, has announced that all the Greek troops in Thrace have crossed the Maritza river and that the military evacuation of that territory was complete.
