

Kingston Jca., Nov. 25th.—Heavy shock of earthquake experienced Kingston at 1.18 p m today.

London, Nov. 25th. Princess Mary yesterday made her first public appearance with Lord Lascelles, her fiancée, since their betrothal, when the two left Buckingham Palace in an open carriage with the Queen, for a drive through Hyde Park. Although the news that they were to drive out only became known shortly before their departure, quite a large crowd assembled in the vicinity of Buckingham Palace and cheered the Royal party heartily as the carriage drove away. Crowds quickly gathered along the route and made the drive partake of the nature of a triumphal procession, much to the perceptible embarrassment of Princess Mary and the apparent satisfaction of the Queen and Lord Lascelles. The Queen and the Princess lunched with Lord Lascelles at his home, Chesterfield House, which will eventually be the home of Princess Mary. It is reported that invitations will be issued to seven European Monarchs to attend the wedding, Spain, Norway, Italy, Denmark, Sweden and Belgium possibly will attend.

New York, Nov. 25th.—M. Briand was a passenger on the S. S. "Paris", sailing today for Havre on his trip home.

Guatemala City, Nov. 26th. Several earthquakes have occurred in this city during the last few days. None of them however has caused any damage.

London, Nov. 25th.—All the men in the Crown Mines have struck, Reuters Johannesburg correspondent cables. The Company has issued a notice discharging the strikers and stating that unless the men return to work before next Monday, the management will be compelled to close the mines and that the services of all the men and contractors on daily pay will no longer be required and be considered terminated as from Tuesday.

Trieste, Nov. 25th.—Bomb explosions, attributed by the authorities to anarchistic elements, have been recurring for the past few days in various parts of the city. One explosion occurred yesterday in the garden of Senator Uccelli, Manager of a large company here, and another bomb exploded in the home of Senator Pollich, Manager of the Trieste Navigation Company. In addition, Senator Miller, President of the Trieste Typographers Union, was killed in an attack by the Fascisti. Senator Miller was blamed by the Fascisti for preventing the publication of newspapers.

London, Nov. 25th.—The Labourites are still forecasting an early general election with great persistence. Mr. Thomas M. P. and leader of the railway men's organization, repeated the prediction in a speech at Derby yesterday, but thought a general election at a time when the Premier said there were signs of trade revival, would be mere criminal

folly. They could not have an election on the Irish issue alone, he said. The House of Commons could give a sufficient mandate on the question as to whether Ireland should remain part of the empire, but with the status of a nation. Mr. Thomas advocated cancellation of war debts between nations to assist trade recovery. This policy is now rapidly becoming an orthodox tenet of both the labour parties.

Dublin, Nov. 25th.—Opinion here tonight is that a critical point in the Irish negotiations have been reached. A full meeting of the Dail Eireann Ministry was held this afternoon, but no statement was issued beyond the formal notice that the meeting was held and that the situation is considered too delicate for public statements. Arthur Griffith, of the Sinn Fein delegation, will carry with him when he leaves for London tonight the decision of the Dail Eireann Ministry. His visit to Dublin was unexpected and was taken to indicate that new proposals were submitted by the British Govt., which necessitated an authoritative answer on behalf of the Eireann.

Calais, Nov. 26th.—Seven officers and thirty-six privates, the last of the four and a half million men constituting the British Expeditionary Forces, have embarked for England after an absence of 7 years. No official ceremony attended the departure. The French Govt. had suggested a send off celebration, but the War Office decided otherwise. Private farewells on the quay however were extremely cordial. The last British army motor car and the last lorry were turned over to the disposal board here, to be sold at public auction.

London, Nov. 26th.—Unemployment depression continues to deepen in the Lancashire mill districts. An increase of 18,000 unemployed was registered at the labor exchange for the week. A change for the worse is markedly noticeable in the cotton trade and in the engineering plants and there is no indication of early activities. Nevertheless the tramway workers, who of course are on regular work, are repeating their refusal to work on Christmas and the following day. Some local authorities announce that if this refusal is persisted in, such workers will lose the two days summer holiday, which in the past had been granted with full pay.

London, Nov. 26th.—The "Daily Graphic" this morning says it is extremely probable that Mr. Lloyd George will go to Washington shortly, as it is said that his presence at the Armament Conference there has become necessary.

London, Nov. 26th.—Princess Mary and her fiancée, Viscount Lascelles, were given a tremendous popular ovation tonight when they attended a charity performance at the hippodrome. The King and Queen and other royalties, including the Queen of Norway, were in the royal

box with the engaged couple. The entire audience stood and sang the national anthem as the royal party was seated. Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles also were wildly cheered by masses of the people while going to and coming from the performance.

Tokio, Nov. 26th.—A cabinet council held yesterday, according to the newspapers, resulted in a decision to instruct the Japanese delegation to Washington to do their utmost to maintain a 70 percent ratio with regard to naval armaments.

London, Nov. 26th.—Reuters correspondent at Melbourne cables that there will be 3,000 miles of organized aerial highways in Australia shortly. The Australian Federal Government has just accepted tenders for aerial mail services from Adelaide to Sydney and from Sydney to Brisbane.

London, Nov. 27th.—Answering the French note on the subject of the treaty recently negotiated by France with the Turkish Nationalist Govt. at Angora, to which Great Britain has taken exception in some particulars, a British note was handed on Friday night to the French Ambassador here.

Ottawa, Nov. 27th.—Admiral Earl Beatty scored his first Canadian triumph when he took the capital by storm this morning. Thousands of people jammed the central station and the streets leading to the City Hall to catch a glimpse of the famous sea-fighter, and to cheer. "The fact that I am here today and am able to accept your invitation is indication that all goes well at the conference at Washington", so declared Earl Beatty, addressing the Ottawa Canadian Club on Saturday.
