the cocoa-nut possesses a really high nutritive value. The globulin of the cocoa-nut was sufficient to support the growth of rats without any other source of protein. It is stated that cocoa-nut press cake provides a source of protein of high nutritive value, and it also contains water-soluble and fat-soluble vitamins. —*Agricultural News*.

West Indian beekeepers may be interested in the trial of a system of keeping two queens in a hive described in the *Queensland Agricultural Journal* for July 1919. It is stated that the two prolific young queens caused the production of more brood than in an ordinary colony containing only one queen. In fact, by this system it is claimed to be possible to double the number of colonies every year. —*Ibid.*

BARBADOS NEWS.

September has given a fair supply of rain and the crops continue to make up leeway. It is the coming month which planters look forward to with greatest expectations. The plant canes are healthy but low, the rats are said to be causing great anxiety. This is especially the case with second ratoons, the first not being so bad. The land is fairly ready in many places for planting, which will be somewhat earlier in many places, where labour has been freely available than in past years.

There are reports of ill-feeling at some places owing to the turning off of tenants to extend cane cultivation; and it may be seriously questioned whether the slender

addition to the area of cultivation is worth the long continued unrest and ill-feeling which the change necessitates.

There are sporadic cases of misconduct here and there, but as a whole the relations between the agricultural labourer and employer are amicable and easy going. In industrial circles where the high cost of living, and the cost of high living—since a good deal of extravagance and unthrift is hopelessly mixed up with the changed conditions—are being made so the basis of the demands for increased wages and along with this, a demand for reduced working hours. That one demand may in many cases be fatal to the granting of the other is too little appreciated. —*Barbados Advocate, Sept. 30th.*
