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TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Oct. 22nd.—Settlement of the Vilna incident has turned over to the League of Nations entirely and France will make no further reply to the Polish note sent jointly to France and Great Britain, the French Foreign Office announced today.

Ottawa Oct. 22nd.—For a period at least the Board of Commerce of Canada as a court has ceased to exist. In consequence of the reversal of its judgment regarding sugar prices and the trade in the commodity, the commissioners comprising the Board have resigned. The Govt. moreover, has accepted their resignation and has decided not to take steps to reconstruct the tribunal until the judicial committee of the privy council in England has given a decision on the case now before it and so defined the fact of the Board's power to control profits.

Indianapolis, Oct. 22nd.—Reflecting the break in the wheat market yesterday flour dropped as much as one dollar a barrel at local mills today. At the largest mill the price for family patents was reduced to 11 dollars from 12 dollars a barrel, while at another mill a decline of 35 cts. was elected, its quotation being \$10.95 a barrel.

Brussels, Oct. 22nd.—An immense crowd yesterday attended the funeral of Genl. Leman the defender of Liege. The body arrived from Liege, where the Genl. died suddenly from pneumonia, and was met at the station by representatives of the King and Govt. and military and civil authorities. The streets were lined with troops, ex-soldiers and school children. The French and Italian

armies were represented by delegations. Members of the Diplomatic Corps and the Court of Justice awaited the arrival of the cortege at Parliament House while orations were delivered.

Montreal, Oct. 22nd.—The following cable has been received here from Albania: "The Serbians are destroying Albania and Montenegro with fire and sword. 3,000 refugees from Dibra are now in Tirana, capital of Albania. All Dibra and half of Mathia are destroyed. In the district of Dibra alone, 4,000 houses have been burnt.

Dublin Oct 22nd —Nineteen policemen were ambushed at Parkwood, King's County today. The driver of the police car was shot dead and one constable was wounded. A member of the attacking party was seen to fall during the exchange of shots.

London Oct. 23rd.—The extreme tension over the miners' strike seemed slightly relaxed this morning. Leaders of the National Union of railwaymen and Miners Federation were ready for their conference as to the situation. There have been no developments since efforts to find a road to peace were begun, but the public has not given up hope. The House of Commons will defer until Monday the consideration of a measure giving the Government wide powers to meet any grave situation that might develop. The "Evening Standard" says the miners' executive committee is to be asked to meet the Premier and his experts at Downing Street.

London, Oct. 24th.—The Armenian troops, according to a "Times" despatch have begun a counter-attack, against the Turks on the entire front.

London, Oct. 24th.—Her Majes y, the Queen, has presented to the people of Canada the dress worn by her at the coronation festivities and also that worn by her on their Majesties' drive through London after the coronation and on the state entry into Delhi on December 7th 1911. These dresses are for the Royal Ontario Museum.

New York, Oct. 24th.—Vice Admiral Sir W. Pakenham, who succeeds Vice Admiral Sir Trevelyan Napier, who died in Hamilton Bermuda, two months ago, as chief of the British North Atlantic and West Indies Fleet, arrived today with his staff, including Flag Lieut. Curzon Howe, nephew of Earl Curzon, Foreign Secretary. They will sail for Bermuda, the fleets base, on the S. S. Fort Victoria.
