TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 19th.—Information received in official circles regarding Upper Silesia states that the Polish Consul General at Beuthen has informed the Inter-Allied Plebiscite Commission that Adalbert Korfanty has issued a proclamation to the people of Upper Silesia to surrender their arms, resume work and avoid military contact with the Germans. He declared also that 10,000 men have been demobilized.

Berlin, May 19th.—Eitel Friedrich, second son of former Emperor William who was yesterday found guilty of illegally exporting Capital to Holland, was fined five thousand marks. He will also have to pay the cost of the trial.

Washington, May 19th.—Edward Douglas White, Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, died early this morning at a hospital here, where he submitted to an operation last Friday.

Washington, May 19th.—A special despatch received here from Helsingfors says Lenine has requested permission to go to London to continue negotiations in connection with the Anglo-Russian trading relations.

London, May 18th.—The Govt. has withdrawn its objections to racing, so far as the Doncaster, Salisbury and Windsor meetings in May are concerned. All the King's horses entered at these meetings, however, have been scratched.

London, May 20th.—The dinner of welcome by Pilgrims Society to the American Ambassador, Mr. Geo. Harvey, last night, was enveloped in far deeper interest than usually attends a reception to a new Ambassador by this International Club. Not only was it Mr. Harvey's first public appearance since his appointment to the post. But there was a general expectation that he would reveal something of the new administration policy towards European affairs. The Ambassador did not disappoint his audience, for he sharply brushed aside any lingering illusions that the United States would have any relations whatever with the League of Nations. He also announced his appointment to represent the President in the Supreme Council in the discussion over Silesia. Mr. Lloyd George made an eloquent speech, but rather disappointed those who hoped for more official plain-speaking
