PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) remarked: Mr. Chairman. One party wants macadam and the other party wants concrete roads. Now I look upon the honorable 4th Member for Frederiksted Country District's amendment as putting oil on troubled waters. It takes the decision of a matter of which only a very few of the members of this Council have any real knowledge and places the decision in the hands of experts, namely, the Road Commission and the Public Works Officer, who then have the responsibility. I can therefore favor the amendment with which I should think both parties would be satisfied.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. That's the point I am trying to impress upon the Council. A concrete road might be the best in the world, but I claim that conditions do not warrant the ripping up of our macadam roads to replace them with concrete only to satisfy a few persons. Are we in a position financially to undertake an expense such as is called for in this Ordinance? Who would want a concrete road on the northside.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen): I would.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood): I can quite understand that you would. You want the whole Island.

5th Appointed Member (Lunney) remarked: Mr. Chairman. We are having a great controversy over this matter. Our roads have just been repaired and we have an opportunity of seeing the amount of damage done by the heavy trucks.

The ordinary method of making roads without a roller or stone crusher is not solid enough for the heavy traffic we are having at present; it is necessary that we have good roads so as to enable us to transport our product to the Central Factory. If you will allow me Mr. Chairman I will read an extract from a letter from the Public Works Officer in St. Thomas, (the Member read the extract) and said, —This is to show you the trend of events in the United States.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I have read the letter just read by the Honorable Member, it is fine reading; if the foundation of our roads were to be ripped up a proper foundation would have to be put in. My contention is, we do not need new roads, all we need at present is to improve our old roads by reenforcing them.
