St. Thomas News.

Monday saw put into vogue a new departure from the ordinary, in the school-life of the island, when the children of Jefferson School underwent a physical examination.

This examination has been very much advocated in the United States, and in many of them it has become law. Thus the school authorities in St. Thomas have not adopted a high-handed method as some individuals who disapprove of the measure may think, but have simply fallen "into line" with a more advanced idea in modern hygiene.

The value of compulsory physical examination in the schools cannot be overestimated; and as the measure tends towards the moulding of the young into better men and women, morally as well as physically, it behooves every parent to give every possible aid in the physical examination of their children.

We extend our congratulations to School-Director Nase for the steps initiated by his department, and hope to see the measure soon extended to the private schools. — *St. Thomas Mail Notes*, 28th Jan.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Jan. 31st.—The "Sunday Ob-

server" in a long article on the task of the empire and its difficulties said the succession of Mr. Winston Churchill to the office of Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the resignation of Viscount Milner, was a signal and perhaps an epoch making event. The paper credits Mr. Churchill with indomitable courage and inexhaustible energy and in the Colonial Office, which will receive some new title, such as the Ministry of Imperial Affairs, in order to express its unexampled range. Mr. Churchill, it says, will have an office better fitting his powers than any held before. Mr. Churchill has in this great matter the great belief which he holds, that the economic resources of the British system can and must be developed to relieve every difficulty of debts and of exchanges. He holds that the empire can and must be maintained. He holds that without insane rivalry with the United States, sea-power, which is the sole basis of empire, can and must be secured at any cost and that the trident shall not slip from a nerveless hand. In this spirit of approach to the Ministry of Imperial affairs, he breathes, like Mr. Chamberlain, faith, hope and action. To that touch of confidence and resource the nation and Dominions will respond.

New York, Jan. 31st.—Sugar was steady early at 3½ cents for Cuba's, cost and freight, equal to 4.89 for centrifugals. There were sales of 2,575 bags of San Domingo due to arrive next week at 38 cents cif., equal to 4.89 for centrifugals. Refined sugar was unchanged at 7.50 for fine granulated. Demand continues light. Sugar futures were firmer on covering, and some buying of the summer months by commission houses. Prices at midday were 5 to 13 points net higher.

Washington, Jan. 31st.—President Wilson refused today to commute the ten-year sentence imposed on Eugene Deb's for violation of the Espionage Act. The President disapproved the recommendation of the Department of Justice that Deb's sentence be commuted to expire on February 12th next.

London, Jan. 31st.—The Central News learns that the Russian Soviet Government is expected to ratify the Krassin agreement without change. According to this information it approves M. Krassin's work, and appoints him representative at London.

London, Jan. 31st.—The Cork Corporation today reelected Donald Ocallaghan Lord Mayor. Towards the close of the meeting a police force arrived and arrested three of the aldermen and seven councillors, taking them away to the barracks.

Paris, Feby. 1st.—The Council of Ministers met today with President Millerand presiding, and heard the result of the Paris conference of the Allies presented by Premier M. Briand. President Millerand expressed his complete satisfaction with the outcome, and warmly
