TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Aug. 29th.—James Masterton Smith has been appointed permanent Under Secretary for the Colonies, in succession to Sir George Fiddes, who has occupied the position since 1916.

London, Aug. 29th.—The rebels in the Calicut district have increased to 15,000 and the area of the rebellion has been extended, says a despatch to the "Daily Mail" from Allahabad. The expectation of famine is due to disorganization in trade and communication. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Bombay says the whole of the beautiful forest tract surrounding the Nilambur palace has been laid waste, and every Hindu house in the district looted. One of the rebel leaders has established himself in the palace as ruler. Evidence is accumulating, says the despatch, that the success of the rebels in obtaining arms and ammunition was due to the treachery of individual members of the native police and former Sepoys. A Reuter cable from India reports that Indian troops are proceeding from Cannore to the northern districts to quell the risings of the Moplah tribes. A Calicut despatch says the losses to date are several Europeans, many Hindus massacred, 20 men of the Leinster Regiment and 16 native policemen missing and about 700 of the rebels have been killed.

London, August 29th.—Labour leaders, comprising a majority of the Municipal Council of Poplar, one of the Boroughs of Metropolitan London, recently refused to levy certain rates, and

a high court judgement was delivered against them by which it was indicated that unless they reconsidered their decision they would be imprisoned. Yesterday there was a great demonstration near the tower of London in which all the West End Boroughs participated in support of the Poplar members decision not to levy the rates. The huge procession was headed with a banner inscribed "Poplar councillors are determined to go to prison to secure equalization of rates for poorer Boroughs." Speakers urged the East End people to begin a huge "no rent, no rates, no taxes" strike. They said the movement would give labour the biggest victory ever won by the cause. The councillors reemphasized that they could not levy the rates, and would cheerfully go to prison. It is expected that they will be arrested this week.

Geneva, Aug. 29th.—Twenty eight nations have ratified the International court provided for under the covenant of the League of Nations, thus assuring the permanent establishment of the court. Ninety candidates have been nominated for a judgeship.

Dublin, Aug. 29th.—The Republicans were busy today consulting together and also with their supporters concerning the Irish situation, but it was officially announced at six o'clock this afternoon that no reply to the latest communication of Mr. Lloyd George would be sent to London tonight. Officials at Dublin castle and other persons interested in the success of the peace negotiations seemed unperturbed tonight over the delay in replying to Mr. Lloyd George. It was admitted at the castle, which generally has received early news of any decision the Dail Eireann is to make that it was not known what the latest reply of Mr. De Valera and his followers would be. Optimism however prevailed at the castle and likewise among a large section of the public. It is considered probable that the reply drafted by the cabinet may be altered to some extent on the advice of persons outside the Dail Eireann. It has been alleged that Mr. De Valera's previous letter to the Prime Minister was toned down before it was sent to London. The report that Michael Collins, the Sinn Fein Minister of Finance intends to carry the battle for a united Ireland into the "enemys country". It was said tonight that if Mr. Collins achieved any success Eamon De Valera and Arthur Griffith, who also represented Ulster constituencies in the Northern Parliament, may follow the suit of Mr. Collins. The move of Mr. Collins is considered here to be a dangerous one, the belief prevailing that his visit to Ulster may be resented by the Ulsterites and lead to trouble.

Hull, England Aug. 29th.—The body of Air Commodore R. M. Maitland, of the British flying force, who lost his life in the disaster of the ZR2 last week, was recovered from the wreck of the dirigible

late this afternoon. Inquests were opened this afternoon on the last four bodies recovered from the ZR2. As in the previous cases, this was a mere formality to enable the coroners inquest to issue burial certificates, and after identification testimony was given, the inquests were adjourned to October 4th, by which time it is expected that all the bodies that can be recovered will have been found, and the inquest can proceed. Three other bodies were also recovered by the indistinguishable salvages from the wreckage. There are those of Mr. Campbell, Superintendent of the Royal Air Works where the dirigible was built, C. W. Buffield, of the National Physical Laboratory, and Cialler, an American rigger, Commodore Maitland's body was entangled in wires and before it could be secured these wires had to be cut. The body was badly mutilated, and his hand was still grasping a control cord. The control car of the airship is believed to be among the wreckage brought ashore today.

Berlin, Aug. 30th.—Germany today was under restrictions closely approaching martial law, as a result of a decree issued late yesterday by President Ebert. Meetings, processions, demonstrations and the issuance of publications likely to encourage seditious movements were forbidden in the decree, and warning was given that any and every insurrection would be suppressed with relentless severity. Majority and Independent Socialists have made formal demands upon Chancellor Wirth that elements responsible for Republican activities be restricted by the Government. The decree issued by the President became effective on publication and its execution has been placed in the hands of the Ministry of the Interior. German organized labour, comprising 11,000,000 members belonging to the general and independent federation, informed Chancellor Wirth yesterday that it was ready to go to the front in defence of the Republic. The majority and independent Socialists also sent a deputation to the Chancellor, informing him that both parties demand that the Government proceed without fear or favour against the elements responsible for anti Republican demonstrations and machinations, to which the assassination of Herr Erzberger is attributed.
