SCANDALOUS PUBLIC BEHAVIOUR AT THE POST OFFICE.

The regular Saturday mails from St. Thomas, Porto Rico and the States were received here on the evening of the 20th. and as customary, a large gathering assembled in the Post Office lobby where during the assortment of the mails, box-holders may receive their letters as these are distributed into the boxes. On this

occasion, however, the behaviour of the crowd assumed such a boisterous, rowdy character that those having boxes were discommoded by the continuous scuffling, quarrelling, and vociferous chatter which increased to such an extent that the postmaster was forced to ask and then to demand some moderation of the tumult which must certainly have been confusing to any one engaged in almost any sort of work. But still the crowd, or more correctly speaking, a dozen or more of the riff-raff in the crowd, who probably expected no mail, continued its ill-bred conduct, and when the windows opened for the general delivery, it was found impracticable to continue this for more than about 5 minutes owing to the uproar among the vagrants defeating all efforts at hearing or being heard. The postmaster had previously called upon the civil authorities to preserve order, but as no policeman could be secured, the post office was ultimately closed in accordance with the Postal Laws and Regulations governing action under such circumstances. It is not recalled that the public behaviour at the Post Office has in any former instance attained such disorderly proportions and it is to be hoped that this is the last time persons in this community will thus humiliate their fellow citizens by a display of deportment which is anything but creditable to decent people who should know that apart from the inflating impression such outlandish manners must necessarily produce upon strangers in this case, the primary object of going to the post office is, as a result, frustrated for all. If occurrences of this sort continue police protection will in future be preengaged in order that the general public may be avoided inconveniences and delay in the receipt of their mail.
