TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 12th.—For several days past an unmistakable if intangible feel-

ing that there will be an early settlement of the miners strike, has been everywhere apparent. Mr. Lloyd George had nothing new to tell the mine-owners in the House of Commons last night. He merely stated that Government had made certain suggestions, which the miners had rejected and added that the Home Secretary was in no way responsible for the present position of the controversy. The Premier further declared that the Govt. was considering the possibility of introducing legislation which would prohibit the receipt of foreign money, intended to be devoted to revolutionary propaganda movements in the British Isles. In Glasgow and the west of Scotland, the railway extremists have declared for a sectional strike to begin at midnight tonight, but it is very far from certain that other railway and transport workers will make any general response to this strike call. Coal mine owners in certain districts are making an effort to reopen the pits with scratch labour. The general labour situation, which was sufficiently bad, was further aggravated today by a strike of 8,000 electrical workers against a proposed reduction of wages.

Ponce, P. R. May 14th. Fire started this morning in the largest hardware establishment of this town next to the City Hall. Owners Messrs Trujillo Subina Successors. Estimated damage 250,000 dollars, reported partly covered by insurance.

Antwerp, May 15th. —400,000 tons of coal are tied up here, as a result of the refusal of the members of the dock work union to load coal destined for England. All the goods yards are choked. The dockworkers have refused to handle coal for England, in order to show their solidarity with coal miners of Great Britain.

Quebec, May 15th.—Fire this morning swept through the Montcalm Hotel

block fronting on St. John's Street, Glacis Street, St. Joachim and St. Eustach Street, and caused damage estimated in the vicinity of \$100,000. The insurance carried on the buildings was \$70,000.

Rome, May 15th.—General elections were held throughout Italy today. Members of Parliament were chosen, but so far as related to the country, no definite results were known this evening. In Rome, the constitutionalists claimed a great triumph.
