to discuss the subject, Mr. Bonar Law, Govt. leader declared in the House of Commons today. Mr. Bonar Law made the statement in answering questions with reference to Mr. Lloyd George's speech at the Guildhall in which he stated that he was opposed to an attempt to negotiate peace with the Bolshevik. He declared the Premier simply expressed the hope that there would be some method of achieving peace with Russia.

Victoria, Nov. 10th. -With uniformed marines drawn up at attention and the band playing stirring march music the battle cruiser Newzealand glided into Esquimalt harbour on Saturday afternoon, beginning Admiral Jellicoe's Canadian lap of his empire tour. Lord Jellicoe was the guest this evening at an official dinner given to him on behalf of the Dominion Govt, Vice Admiral Kingsmill being the host.

Ottawa, Nov. 8th. -The fight in the Senate on the bill providing for the acquisition of the Grand Trunk railway came to a close last night when the bill was reported from committee and given its third reading without division.

Washington, Nov. 11th. -Elaborate welcoming ceremonies had been arranged for the arrival here at two o'clock today of the Prince of Wales as the guest of the nation. Although the Prince was greeted

by Secretary of State Lansing and High army and navy officials late yesterday, when his special train crossed the Canadian border at Rouse Point, Ny, the programme prepared by the State Department called for a more formal welcome here today by Vice-President Marshall, acting for President Wilson, and members of the Cabinet. During his three days stay in Washington the Prince and party will occupy the home of Mr. Percy Belmont. Following his welcome at the station and after a drive through the capital grounds and up Pennsylvania avenue the Prince is to entertain the members of his party informally at luncheon. The afternoon is set aside for receiving visitors and paying call that at the White House being the chief one. Rear Admiral Grayson, the President's personal physician, informed the State Department yesterday that the Prince might visit President Wilson in his sick room if he desired to do so. Vice President Marshall will give a dinner in honour of the Royal guest tonight at the Belmont residence, after which an informal congressional reception is to be held. The programme arranged for the Prince is less crowded and more flexible than that followed by the King and Queen of Belgium during their recent visit. The only set events are a motor trip tomorrow to Mount Vernon, a dinner tomorrow night by Secretary Lansing and a dinner on Thursday night at the British Embassy.

Washington, Nov. 9th. -Characterizing all strikes as "Industrial barbarism" and declaring that "there is no place in this country either for industrial despotism or labour despotism, the Senate committee authorized to investigate the steel strike, presented a report today covering its hearings both in

Washington and in Pittsburg and criticizing both the workers and the employers in the controversy which resulted in at least a partial disruption of the steel industry. The committee's main conclusion concurred in by all members, was expressed in the statement that "the public has a right to demand that capital, shall not arrogate to itself the right to determine, in its own way those industrial questions and it is the same as to labour, and the duty is upon Congress to provide some way of adjusting these difficulties". Committee members who conducted the investigation were fairly unanimous in the report, though leaving open points on which they could not agree. Treating on the causes of the strike, the committee in its report expresses the opinion that the walkout was precipitated by the determination of the American Federation of Labour to organize the steel industry. Wages are not a factor in the strike the committee held, being high enough to give no reason for dissatisfaction, the hours of the workers, however, the committee
