## TELEGRAMS

### ST. CROIX STATION.

Glasgow, Sept. 9th.—The cooperation with international labourities in the campaign to procure Germany's admission to the League of Nations, and for an immediate revision of "the harsh treaty provisions which are inconsistent with statements made on behalf of the Allies at the time of the armistice" was overwhelmingly pledged today by the Trade Union Congress in session here. The resolution was moved by delegate Mr. Williams of the Transport Workers Union, who is a direct actionist who urged as the first step for the reconciliation of the peoples the inauguration of a new era of international cooperation and goodwill. The champions of direct acting today won a clean-cut victory by the congress voting to refer back a portion of the parliamentary committee's report, owing to the failure to explain the Committee's reason for refusing to call a special conference for the purpose of discussing the advisability of employing direct action to secure abolition of conscription and the other questions. The vote to refer back was 2,586,000 to 1,670,000 against. Before the vote was taken, Mr. Dunning, the presiding officer, warned the delegates that reference back would be considered as a censure of the parliamentary committee. Chairman Brownlie, of the Executive Council of the Amalgamated Engineers, addressed the Congress on the question of increasing the industrial output. He declared it was imperative to maintain production. Mr. Smillie objected to a "lecture" being delivered by the speaker, which Mr. Mills of the engineers said that Mr. Brownlie had tra-

Winnipeg, Sept. 9th.—A large and enthusiastic crowd greeted H. R. H. the Prince of Wales when he arrived in Winnipeg today on his special train with a distinguished entourage. A civic holiday has been proclaimed, and the streets which were gay with bunting, were thronged with people.

Auckland, N. Z., Sept. 9th.—Reuter's. Admiral Lord Jellicoe declares that the forecasts recently made of the contents of his report to the Commonwealth Govt. are quite incorrect.

Washington, September 9th.—Counsellor Debuchi, in charge of the Japanese Embassy, today authorized a categorical denial of a statement attributed to Bolshevik sources in Moscow, that Admiral Kolchak had appealed to Japan for help, offering in return the northern portion of the island of Saghalien and the Ussuri Valley on the mainland of Siberia.

New York, September 9th.—Cardinal Mercier, Primate of Belgium, arrived here today. The Cardinal was met down the bay by the Mayor's Committee of welcome and church officials aboard the police patrol boat.

London, September 9th.—Mr. W. Pringle, formerly Liberal member for north-west Lanark, has been adopted Liberal candidate for the Rushelme division of Manchester, left vacant by Mr. R. B. Stoker, deceased. The election will be notable as Mr. Pringle professes to be "a straight liberal," having been an uncompromising opponent of the coalition government. The conservative candidate has not yet been announced.

London, September 10th.—The Admiralty has given orders that the home fleet of battleships stationed at Portland and the Fourth and Fifth Destroyer Flotilla be reduced to a reserve basis on October 1st. The Twentieth Flotilla will likewise be reduced on completion of its service in the Baltic. The reconstructed Fourth Destroyer Flotilla and the Second Light Cruiser Squadron, fully manned, will join the Atlantic Fleet. The submarine flotillas attached to the Atlantic Fleet will be reduced to three, namely, seven each of the "K", "B" and "H" classes.

London, Sept. 10th.—Colonel John Ward, Labour Member of the House of Commons, who has just returned from Russia, in an interview said that, to desert the Russians, who had rallied to our standard will make our name stink in the nostrils of every non-Bolshevik Russian. We went to Russia to prevent the Germans from transferring men to the western front. Are we now to say to those who rallied around us "you have served our turn we are going to wish you luck"? "That," said Colonel Ward, is unthinkable. It would be black treachery to leave them to face the enemies they have made for our sakes without anything more substantial than "our good-will."

Leamington, Ont., Sept. 10th.—Tobacco-growers of Essex and Kent countries and the adjoining districts are busily at work on the harvesting of the biggest and best tobacco crop they have ever raised. They estimate that this year's yield will total over 16,000,000 pounds of all varieties, with an aggregate value of over \$4,150,000.
