

which it was declared that the Government would not hesitate to resort to drastic steps to maintain law and order in Ireland, the authorities today proclaimed the suppression of the Sinn Fein Parliament and Sinn Fein organizations throughout Ireland. There were slight disorders in a few places, but no reports of serious resistance to the raiders have been received up to the present. A detective was shot and killed in Dublin. In the raids, some arms and explosives were found. Large quantities of documents and Sinn Fein literature were seized, notably in Dublin, where every copy of the report of Messrs. Walsh and Dunne, who investigated conditions in Ireland on behalf of the American-Irish Societies and correspondence relating to arranging trade relations between Ireland and the United States and other foreign countries, fell into the hands of the authorities. The Gazette tonight prints the proclamation issued by the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, prohibiting and suppressing the Sinn Fein Parliament, known as the "Daily Eirann", it refers to the proclamation of July 3rd., suppressing the Sinn Fein organizations as unlawful associations. It describes the "Daily Eirann" as a dangerous association, and says that since July it has been employed for all the purposes of the then suppressed organizations. The proclamation applies to the thirty-two counties and six county boroughs of Ireland.

Paris, Sept. 12th.—A Montenegrin official communication issued here says that fighting continues fiercely throughout Montenegro against the Serbian invaders who have suffered severe losses. The Serbians have sent 15,000 reinforcements by way of Bosnia and Cattaro. The communication complains of atrocities upon Montenegrin men and women.

London, Sept. 12th.—Following is the result of the Wilnes bye-election held yesterday: Henderson (Labourite) 11,404 Fisher (Coalition Unionist) 10,417.

Sydney, N. S. W., Sept. 12th.—(Reuter's.) The Govt. has guaranteed the farmer's five shillings per bushel for the 1920-1921 wheat crop.

London, Sept. 12th.—Gold valued at £850,000, which is the half of a shipment just received from South Africa, has been sold for shipment to the United States, the price including commission being 90 shillings four pence half-penny per ounce. This is twenty-five per cent above the Bank of England's ordinary buying rate.

Paris, Sept. 13th. The situation between Roumania and the Entente appears to be brighter. A cordial meeting was held by the Foreign Minister M. Erichon and M. Missu, the Roumanian representative in Paris, and M. Taida, one of the Roumanian peace delegates who yesterday expressed the desire of Roumania to safeguard their countries national dignity, but to uphold her avowed intention to remain on friendly rela-

tions with the Entente. President Poincare also received the Roumanian delegates yesterday.

Glasgow, Sept. 13th.—The Trades Union Congress which has been in session here all week, ended today with the passage of a resolution re-affirming the right of free speech, and protesting against the arrest and deportation of alien Trades Union officials, for alleged connection with Bolshevism. The resolution also expressed a belief in the necessity for continuing the control of food prices. Mr. Thomas, Labour Member of Parliament, together with Mr. Smillie, the miners' leader, moved an emergency resolution denouncing military rule in Ireland, and declaring the only solution of the Irish problem was through the method of self determination by which the Irish people could work out their own salvation. The resolution expressed profound sympathy for the Trades Unionist "Irish brothers in their hour of repression". This resolution was carried unanimously.

London, Sept. 13th.—This morning the citizens of Edmonton extended to the Prince of Wales a formal welcome to this western capital. The citizens are willing to give His Royal Highness the city, or anything else they can persuade him to accept. The day's routine of formal ceremony developed into a triumphant march of a popular hero. Thousands of people thronged the streets and vied with one another to show their deep feelings for the Prince.

London, Sept. 13th.—British forces have been landed at Scutari across the Bosphorus from Constantinople. It is officially explained however, that this was an ordinary troop movement and that only 1,200 men were placed on shore.

Miami, Florida, September 13th.—Two schooners went down at Cat Island (Bahamas group) with all on board during the hurricane several days ago, according to persons who arrived here from the Bahamas today. At Eleuthera Island several buildings were destroyed. In the Windward Islands two schooners were lost and at Walting Island several houses were destroyed.

Toronto, September 12th.—A warning against Toronto retail dealers in flour profiteering any longer has been issued by the Canadian Wheat Board.

London, September 12th.—A loan of 19,000,000 pounds is being negotiated between British financiers and Turkey, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Constantinople. The Crown jewels of Turkey are to be given as security, the despatch adds.

Berlin, Sept. 12th.—The Zeitung Am Mittag says Great Britain will take over from the United States on Sept. 20th. the control of the provisioning of Poland. The newspapers add that the entire 500,000 tons of foodstuffs promised Poland by the United States has been supplied.

Paris, Sept. 13th.—M. Caillaux, former Premier, who has been in prison for more than a year charged with having had treasonable dealing with the enemy, was transferred to a private hospital at Neuilly, a suburb of Paris this morning.

Paris, Sept. 13th.—Hava's. The Austrian Govt. has refused to accede to Hungary's demand for the extradition of Bela Kun, virtually declared at Budapest during the Communist regime, asking for proofs of accusations of murder and theft made against him according to Vienna newspapers. The Govt. note to Hungary states it is said that upon Bela Kun's arrival in Austria he was the bearer of two hundred thousand crowns.

Glasgow, Sept. 13th.—The Trades Union Congress session here yesterday completed the most important business of its programme with the adoption of a resolution providing for the calling of a special conference of British captains of labour to consider the form of action to be resorted to should the Govt. refuse the demands of the congress for the repeal of the conscription law and to withdraw British troops from Russia, the resolution demanding which, the congress had passed previously.

London, Sept. 13th.—At a re-election of a new parliamentary committee for the year at Glasgow congress yesterday the Miners Federation failed to secure representation, although last year they had two members on the committee. Mr. Wilson, leader of the seamen of Great Britain, has lost his seat on the committee. The miners are mostly advocates of direct action and the fact that they failed to secure representation on the committee is regarded by the labour circulars in London as significant, as it is understood direct actionists on the new committee number five, where those opposed to direct action number eleven.
