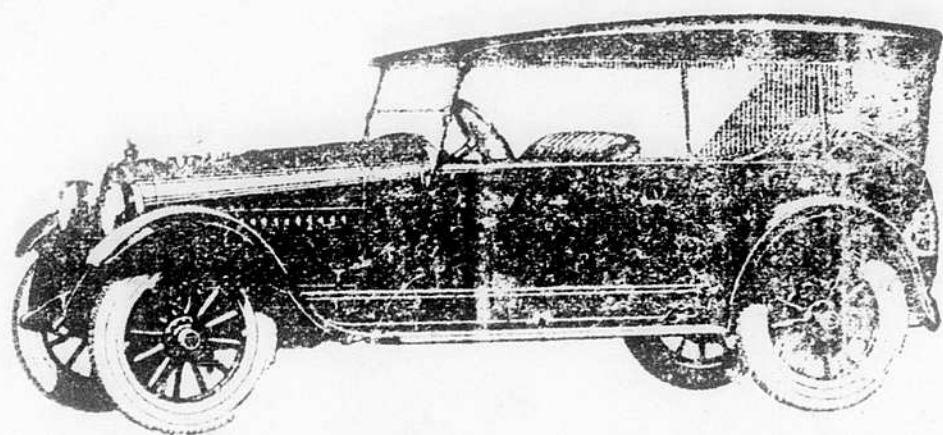

Introduction of and 1st discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 29, Ordinance authorizing the Governor of the Virgin Islands to transfer, on July 1, 1924, the sum of Francs 112,500 from the Reserve Fund of St. Croix to be utilized for general governmental expenditure.

PRESS NOTES.

Information has been received from Washington that Mr. Edward Golder Larkin has been recognized by the United States Government as British Consul at St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, for the islands of St. Thomas and St. Croix.

We are informed that a limited stock of the "Huguenot-Walloon Tercentenary" issue of 1 and 2 cent stamps will be on sale at the Christiansted post office beginning Monday, 23rd instanc. These stamps are issued in commemoration of the three hundredth anniversary of the settling in New Netherland, now the State of New York, of the Walloons in 1624. The one cent is printed in green and the two cent in red. They are larger than the current issue of stamps and the 1 cent has for a central design a view of the ship *New Netherland* upon which the Walloons sailed. The 2-cent represents the landing of the Walloons at Albany, N. Y. In both upper corners are ribbon scrolls bearing the years "1624" at the left and "1924" at the right.
