NEW PARCEL-POST CONVENTION BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND DENMARK.

NOTICE is hereby given that, under the provisions of a new Parcel-Post Convention entered into between the United States and Denmark, which is effective July 1, 1921, the weight limit for parcel-post packages exchanged between the United States (including the Virgin Islands of the United States) and Denmark (including the Faroe Islands, Greenland, and Iceland,) has been fixed at 22 pounds.

The convention also provides that the sender of a registered package is entitled, in case of loss, damage, or rifling thereof, to an indemnity equal to the amount of the actual loss incurred, not exceeding 50 francs (approximately \$9.65) for any one package.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

The Chairman remarked: Hon: Members. We have with us today our new Governor of the Virgin Islands. This is his first visit to St. Croix and his first meeting with the Colonial Council of this Island. I am sure that I express the sentiments of all the Members, when I say that we are happy to have him with us, and that we regret that His Excellency's first visit to our islands has not been under better and more promising conditions than at present exists. We are still suffering from the effects of a prolonged drought, and reaping a small crop with very low prices. The general

Prospect is not as pleasing as we would like it to be, and the future does not look very promising. His Excellency in private conversation has informed me that he hopes to be with us for a few days, let us hope that during that time, in spite of the not too favourable outlook and general conditions now prevailing, that in his goings to and fro throughout the island, he will take away with him when he leaves, such pleasant and congenial remembrances of his visit, that he will desire to come back soon, and often, to be among us.

Governor Kittelle, on behalf of the members of this Council, and of the inhabitants of this Island, whom they represent, I have the pleasure and the honour to extend to you a hearty welcome, and to express the hope that your administration of the Government of these Islands will be successful, and for the welfare and prosperity of its inhabitants.

His Excellency Governor Sumner E. W. Kittelle remarked: Honorable Members before reading my message to you I wish to express the deep regret I feel that there is a vacant chair in the Council Chamber, due to the death of Mr. Svend Jorgensen; for I feel that the island and the Council have lost one who would have been an able counsellor, and one whose absence I shall directly miss. It is also regrettable to find that your Chairman is indisposed, and it is my hope that he will, very shortly and quickly, regain his health that he may be restored to his duties.

Preferably I should speak to you extemporaneously, but whenever I speak I hope there may be no misunderstanding, I wish it to be clearly understood and without doubt, so I am going to reduce my message to writing in every case; it is the better way, and because the example has been set to me by our splendid President of the United States. When I shall have been with you long I shall feel more competent to come before you with something that is worth hearing. At the present I have very little to say and with your permission I will read it.

His Excellency then read his message to the Council, which is as follows;

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

to the Colonial Council for St. Croix.

13 June, 1921.

1. It has been a matter of great regret to me that the condition of the "Vixen", since my inauguration, has been such as to delay my visit to St. Croix, for my interest in this Island is co-equal in every way to that in the other Islands; and I wish through you gentlemen, acting as the representatives of the people, to say to the whole people of St. Croix that I shall study the affairs of the Island just as exhaustively as I have studied and shall continue to study those of the other Islands. I wish to extend my hearty greetings of good will and service to all.

2. I am in a position to say to you, with authority, that the adoption by the Island of St. Croix of a code patterned after American state laws has been a mat-
