Nations today, adopted two more articles in the proposed guarantees for peace, and discussed the special alliances and agreements that could be harmonized or incorporated in a treaty. The committee made considerable progress today but the work before it will require several days more.

London, Aug. 5th.—The death is announced of Lieutenant General Sir Edward Hutton, who was general in charge of the Canadian militia in 1898-1900.

London, Aug. 7th.—Continuing their first innings in their match against Glamorgan yesterday at Cardiff the touring West Indian XI scored 201 runs. Glamorgan started their second innings and at the close of play had scored 324 runs for the loss of 8 wickets. Individual scores follow: Challenor 5, Tarilton 75, Ince 21, Austin 40, Browne 0,

The match will be concluded today.

Dusseldorf, Aug. 6th.—General Degoutte, it is said, has issued an order authorizing the Franco-Belgian engineers to confiscate the stocks of coal and coke in the Ruhr and all property connected therewith, including the houses of workmen who refuse to work for the French. The newspapers say it is the intention on the part of the French to operate the mines and coke ovens themselves, importing French workmen for this purpose.

London, Aug. 6th.—"I believe, the

Prince of Wales is one of the most remarkable young men of our time" declared the Duke of Portland at the opening of the miners' welfare centre on his estate in Nottinghamshire. The Prince recently made a tour of that country. "I read not long ago", continued the Duke, "a statement that the Prince was not a worker. Whoever made that statement could not have known anything about the matter. Ten hours work in a day is a common experience in the Prince's life. He never spares himself for a moment and his spirits and interest in the people never flag".

New York, Aug. 5th.—The opening of the matches between the Army Polo Teams of Great Britain and the United States scheduled to be played September 3rd to 8th at Meadowbrook and Philadelphia will be delayed, it was announced today. Because the London dock workers' strike has interfered with the sailing of the steamship Neminee with ponies of the British team. The Neminee also will carry Count De Madres "Tigers" from India and the team of the Hurlingham Club. In all seventy-five ponies, probably the most valuable pony flesh in the world will cross the Atlantic.

Dublin, Aug. 5th.—Wild scenes occurred in Dublin today in connection with the Irish Trade Union Congress. Delegates going to the mansion house found the approach blocked by a crowd of demonstrators who tried to seize the building shouting, "release the prisoners". The police were powerless to prevent the scenes.

London, Aug. 6th.—Mr. Reginald McKenna, who was Chancellor of the Exchequer in the Asquith Government and was offered the same portfolio by Mr. Baldwin upon his accession to the Premiership, has decided not to take the position according to the newspapers. No official announcement, however, has been made on the question. The Daily Express says it is likely that Mr. Neville Chamberlain, Minister of Health, will be the next Chancellor of the Exchequer. The Daily Express says the names of Sir W. Johnson-Hicks, Financial Secretary to the Treasury, Sir Lansing Worthington-Evans, Postmaster-General and Lt-Col. Amery, First Lord of the Admiralty, are being mentioned in connection with the post. An authoritative statement on the matter is expected shortly. At the time Mr. Baldwin formed his cabinet in May last he took the portfolio of Chancellor of the Exchequer himself in addition to that of the Premier, it being then understood that he would hold it only temporarily, pending the restoration of Reginald McKenna to health, the position having been tentatively accepted by the former chancellor, who was ill.

Lisbon, Aug. 6th.—Texeira Gomez, former Minister to Great Britain, was elected President of the Republic today by 121 votes.
