TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Aug. 30th.—A despatch to the *Evening News* from Milan says the Italian fleet in Taranto harbour has received orders to be prepared to sail in the eventuality of a movement against Greece.

London, Aug. 30th.—Demonstrations against Greeks are reported from all parts of Italy, says a Central News despatch from Rome, but so far as is known no acts of violence have occurred.

Paris, Aug. 30th.—The inter-Allied council of Ambassadors today decided to send a telegram to the Greek Government also the British, French, and Italian Governments, jointly protesting, with the energy that the gravity of the circumstances warrant, against the outcome of which the Italian mission of the commission for delimitation of the Albanian frontier has been the victim. The telegram further invites the Greek Government to institute an immediate investigation into the circumstances surround-

ing the massacre. Decision to send the telegram was taken by the secretaries of the council at a meeting this morning, in the absence of the ambassadors from Paris owing to the vacation season. The Ambassadors have been urgently summoned and will probably reach Paris in time for a meeting tomorrow, when Captain Limperani, General Secretary of the Albanian Boundary Commission, will be heard.

London, Sept. 1st.—The match between the touring West Indian XI and Worcestershire was concluded yesterday at Worcester. The home team continued their second innings, scoring 175 for the loss of 8 wickets, after which the match was abandoned on account of heavy rain. Following are the scores: Worcestershire second innings. Preece 1, Higgins 3, Hopkins 33, H. Higgins 12, Tarbox 0, Gordon (not out) 68, MacLean 34, Root 10, Humpherson 7, extras 7, total for 8 wickets 175. Bowling for the West Indians, John took one wicket for 35 runs, Brown four for 45, Pascall one for 42, Constantine one for 19 and Small one for 27.

Dublin, Aug. 30th.—Tonight the returns in the Dail Eireann elections showed that seats have been won as follows: Government candidate 41, Republicans 28, Independents 14, Farmers 8, Labourites 9. The Republicans appear to be improving their position and assert the belief that they will fulfil their own forecast and win forty seats.

Holyhead, Aug. 30th.—William Cosgrave, President of the Free State Cabinet, and other members of the Irish delegation bound for Geneva to prepare for the Irish Free State's entrance into the League of Nations, arrived here today. When asked what the Free State Government intended to do with Eamon De Valera, now that he had been captured, Mr. Cosgrave said: "We are not yet in power, we must first be elected. I cannot commit myself at the present juncture, but De Valera is so situated that he cannot do any harm. More than that I cannot tell you."

Paris, Aug. 30th.—(Reuter's). Much damage and dislocation to communications has resulted from a wild storm which raged last night over the English Channel and the Brittany coast. A naval squadron engaged in firing exercises was obliged to put into Margate. Many fishing boats were set adrift and one was wrecked outside the entrance to Boulogne, but the crew was saved. One hundred and fifty bathing huts at Havre were swept away.

Constantinople, Aug. 30th.—Two cases of the bubonic plague have occurred in Constantinople. Strong measures have been taken to prevent the spread of the evil.

Wellington, N. Z., Aug. 30th.—New Zealand is contributing 100,000 pounds towards the cost of the Imperial Government establishing a naval base at Singa-
