EDITORIAL.

Now the District Court sittings are over for the present and judgment passed in most of the cases brought before it, it is indeed interesting to review this innovation in legal procedure in St. Croix and to note the healthy effect it appears to engender among all classes of the community among whom His Honor Judge Malmin by his clear thinking, sound judgment and merciful decisions has created an atmosphere of the fullest confidence, respect and personal regard. The judgments awarded in the various cases are generally considered equitable and reasonable and much commendation is expressed at the absence of harsh, cruel decisions which were probably anticipated. It is intimated that the case of the laborer who brutally stabbed and cut up a woman on the highroad was almost too mildly avenged with 6 months hard labor, but if mercy is to be extended in the courts it is possibly such cases which need it most. The shooting case of Mr. Schou has been dealt with judiciously it is felt, and it is not a few persons who are glad for any consideration shown him Mr. Schou, having lived here some years during which he has gained the respect of all who have met him, and who sympathised deeply with him when the unfortunate incident occurred at Mannings Bay the other day. The merits of this case were doubtless well considered.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, Nov. 2nd.—More outrages and attacks on police and reprisals were reported today involving deaths. Many were wounded at Tralee where the situation was so serious that the townspeople this afternoon were fleeing fearing worse. Wholesale raids and searches were carried out in Dublin today. The Duke of Leinster's residence and university college were among the places visited.

London, Nov. 2nd.—Assurances have been asked of Great Britain by the Russian Soviet authorities that she will not countenance the military activities of Generals Balakovich and Petlura, the anti-Soviet commanders, who commenced hostilities against the Bolsheviks after the conclusion of peace with Poland. The request came through Krassin here in London, who yesterday handed a note to the Government complaining that despite the Polish armistice the forces of Balakovich and Petlura were continuing warfare on Soviet Russia with the assistance, the note alleged, of the entente powers. The note asked that Great Britain make it plain that she would not give her approval of these forces in continuing the bloodshed.

London, Nov. 2nd.—In the House of Lords tonight the Irish situation was debated but the motion for an inquiry was rejected.

London, Nov. 2nd.—Much that was complimentary of Canada's hospitality was said at the luncheon today by the Empire Press Union to Lord Burnham, President of the Imperial Press Conference, which toured Canada recently. Lord Burnham also said that Canada wanted British news in Canadian newspapers from the British view point and

the British want almost as much Canadian news in the British press from the Canadian viewpoint.

London, Nov. 3rd.—Miss Sylvia Pankhurst was released from prison today on £2,000 bail pending an appeal. Miss Pankhurst signed an undertaking to sever her connection with the newspaper "The Workers' Dreadnought", an article in which, entitled "Discontent on the lower deck" figured in the charges against. The undertaking also pledged her to abstain from attending public meetings pending the hearing of the case in January.

London, Nov. 4th.—The latest summary of the Scottish liquor poll shows that 149 districts have decided to make no change, 24 favour reduction of licenses and 18 will go dry.

London, Nov. 4th.—Much interest has been aroused by the secession of Lord Henry Cavendish Bentinck from the Ministerial to the opposition side of the House. He has expressed indignation against the Govt. concerning the alleged Irish reprisals. Lieut. Oswald Mosley accompanies Lord Henry to the other side on the same ground.

Sebastopol, Nov. 4th.—The Russian Bolshevik troops are unsuccessfully attacking the line held by Genl. Wrangel's army, south of Perekop. The Soviet army is battering at the 7 mile trench which extends west across the narrow neck of land leading to the Crimean peninsula but Genl. Wrangel's position is quite strong. It has on its left the gulf of Sivash or Putrid Sea. Back of his main lines Genl. Wrangel has heavy naval guns and other artillery. The town of Perekop which has been occupied by the Bolsheviks is a mass of ruins.

Havana, Nov. 3rd.—Dr. Zayas has been elected to the Presidency of Cuba. This is based on returns received by Govt. from three-fourths of the voting points.

Havana, Nov. 4th.—The electoral board which is tabulating the official vote on the Presidential election last night changed the Govt. on the province of Santa Clara and gave the Liberals headed by General Gomez, their candidate for chief executive, a majority of 191. The Government report had given the province to Dr. Zayas, the coalition candidate, by 3,000. The liberal leaders said last night that they expected the final count throughout the island would show a coalition victory, but that they would forward a protest to Washington alleging fraud and asking for another election under United States supervision.

London, Nov. 3rd.—As a result of a ballot on the Govt's offer, the coal strike was called off today and at a meeting of miners delegates immediate resumption of work was ordered. Figures of the balloting by the men showed a majority of 8,459 against acceptance of
