FRENCH CRUISER IN PORT.

The French cruiser "Jeanne d'Arc" arrived shortly before nine o'clock this morning. She fired a salute upon coming into port which was returned by the "Vixen".

The Jeanne d'Arc is a typical French warship, having three funnels forward and three aft. This gives her the appearance, when seen at a distance, of two warships instead of one. She was built before the war and has a tonnage of 11,270 tons. Her commander's name is Spatz.

It is a rather long time since we have had the pleasure of welcoming to our port a unit of the French navy and we hope the officers and men will enjoy themselves well during their two days' stay.
