TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Copenhagen, Feb. 11th—While the plebiscite in the first Schleswig zone

passed off without any serious trouble, the rejoicings in Copenhagen were marked by isolated outbreaks of riots and these culminated in the police station being stormed, the police assaulted, and prisoners arrested for disorderly conduct, were released by the mob. Between midnight and three o'clock this morning, huge and enthusiastic crowds assembled in the Town Hall Square, and a crowd marched to the King's Palace cheering for Schleswig and the New Sovereign, who is expected to shortly cross the old border mounted on a white charger.

London, Feb. 11th. Discussing the nationalization of the mines which was brought forward in a resolution moved in the House of Commons this afternoon by Mr. William Brace of the Miners Federation, Mr. Lloyd George said it would discourage the development of the mining industry and that it would be impossible to have nationalization without bureaucracy and, he added, that what the miners federation wanted was full control of the coal industry and that to land it over thus, would be disastrous to the community and misfortune to the miners themselves. Mr. Brace's amendment was defeated by a vote of 329 to 64.

London, Feb. 11th.—Lord Haldane, who has been mercilessly criticized for his pre-war leanings to Germany, when speaking at a Cambridge University Debate today on the pre-war liberal policy, said that if he had tried to persuade the Germans that Great Britain was not jealous of them, he was not sorry, and that the people of England did not understand the widespread belief in Germany that the British wanted to bring them around. The Government had told

Germany in the strongest language that diplomacy allowed them, that if she attacked France she must not reckon on British neutrality. The great purpose had been to obviate war until Great Britain was able to maintain its burdens, and in the main, he declared, he was proud of the record of the Liberal Government.

London, February 11th.—The drink question was briefly discussed in both Houses of Parliament yesterday. Lord Curzon told the House of Lords that a bill on this subject would be introduced, which would contain provisions for shorter hours of sale, and that the experiment of state management would, certainly, not be dropped. In the House of Commons, the subject was alluded to by Sir Donald MacLean, who said that the fact that America had gone dry was an economic event of the gravest importance to Great Britain. He declared that the British expenditure for drink, absolutely staggered him. The country spent more than 1,164,000,000 pounds for drink in 1914, and this expenditure had increased steadily until it was 1,250,000,000 in 1918 while it was estimated that the expenditure for the year ending March thirty-first next would be nearly 1,400,000,000. He was, he added, unaware what the duty on the consumption for the last named period would produce for the public revenue, but the duty of 1918 was 148,000,000 pounds. It was a form of revenue that all Chancellors of the Exchequer would be pleased to be able to dispense with, and he hoped that the measure proposed by the Government would prove to be a serious attempt to grapple with the evil. The liquor question will be debated in the House of Commons shortly, when, according to a report, Lady Astor will speak on the topic, in which she is much interested, and upon which she addressed several meetings during the parliamentary vacation. It will not be only her maiden speech in the House, but the first occasion for any woman to be heard in Parliament.

Ottawa, Feb. 12th.—An immediate downward revision of the tariff of food-stuffs as well as on machinery, to bring about greater production within Canada, together with an energetic campaign to get the people back to the land, was the feature of an address by Mr. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Liberal Party, to the Ottawa retail groceries at their annual banquet held tonight. Any revision of the tariff, however, Mr. King declared, must be carried out with the interest of all sections of the community in view, and only in that way could the present unduly high cost of living situation be overcome.

Copenhagen, Feb. 12th.—Denmark won an overwhelming victory in the plebiscite held in the Province of Schleswig, according to the official figures issued this morning. These figures show that
