

ly tomorrow morning before the conference of the miners and govt. officials reassemble. Nothing has yet transpired as to the nature of the miners' new demand. The policy of the secretary regarding the agreement continued to be maintained, but apparently the objection of the miners was due to the fear that the agreement as drafted might have the effect of making permanent the application of the principle that wages are dependent upon output, and also to the idea that it might altogether preclude future nationalization.

Dublin, Oct. 27th.—Many thousands of pounds, alleged to belong to the Irish Republic, were discovered and confiscated when military forces raided the Munster and Leinster Bank here yesterday. The money was distributed over several accounts in the bank. It is said the blow is likely to be extremely serious for the Sinn Fein.

Paris, Oct. 27th.—The French Foreign Office received official notification today that Great Britain renounces the rights of confiscation of German property in the United Kingdom. This has caused great surprise, which is freely expressed in French official circles as there had been no previous intimation that such a move was probable. French officials emphasize the gravity of this move as they fear Germany will make a similar request to France, which it is declared could not be granted. However they point out the renunciation of Great Britain of her rights under paragraph 18, annex 11 of part 8 of the treaty of Versailles, is not as sweeping as reported at first. Some complaint is made because France is confronted with an accomplished fact without having been given an opportunity to discuss the matter. It was said at the Foreign Office today that France would send a reply to the British note, but what form the reply would take would not be discussed at this juncture. Official circles add that Great Britain retain her rights in case of voluntary default by Germany.

London, Oct. 27th.—The resignation of the Lithuanian Govt. and the establishment there of a pro-bolshevik regime is reported in a central news despatch from Riga.

Barcelona, Oct. 27th.—Barcelona University students today stoned the British consulate as a protest against the death of the Lord Mayor of Cork. Every window was broken. The students are believed to have been partisans of Catalan Home Rule.

London, Oct. 27th.—In the House of Commons today it was stated the proposal to publish a later account of the battle of Jutland has been abandoned.

London, Oct. 27th.—The body of Mr. MacSweeney is lying in state tonight in St. Georges Cathedral. A body guard composed of members of the Cork and London Brigades of the Irish Volunteer army dressed in civilian clothing is keep-

ing vigil throughout the night beside the coffin which shrouded in a Sinn Fein flag rests on a catafalque in the Cathedral chancel. The first service will be held tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock, when a requiem mass will be celebrated. Absolution will be given by Archbishop Mannix, other dignitaries officiating. At two o'clock in the afternoon the funeral procession will proceed from the Cathedral to Euston Station by way of Blackfriar Bridge, along the embankment through the busy downtown section The Strand, Aldaych and Kingsway.

London, Oct. 27th.—The Govt. Emergency bill which provides for all contingencies in the event that the miners strike should involve the railway and transport workers, was passed through its remaining stages today, and passed the third reading tonight. The vote was 238 to 58. The bill did not have the smooth passage the govt. hoped for. It passed through the committee stage but the govt. had to make further concessions to the demands of the Labour Party. The Bill now provides that nothing in the act shall be construed as authorizing the proclamation of any form of compulsory military service, or industrial conscription, or make it an offence for any person to participate in a strike.

London, Oct. 27th.—Asked today in the House of Commons for an official date of the end of the war, Mr. Bonar Law said it would as nearly as possible correspond with the signing of the Turkish and Bulgarian treaties by Great Britain.

Pekin, Oct. 27th.—An unidentified force of 2,000 Russians equipped with artillery attacked the city Urga, Mongolia, last night, says a Chinese official report. The Chinese garrison which

numbered 1200 men repulsed the attacking force.

Berlin, Oct. 27th.—The municipal employment bureau announces that 733,000 men and women in Germany are unemployed. Of these 150,000 are in Berlin.

Mexico City, Oct. 28th.—The Chamber of Deputies at a special session yesterday officially announced the election of General Obregon as President of the Republic. The Chamber named December 14th as the date for the inauguration of the new executive.

Demerara, Oct. 26th.—It is announced that Mr. Hector Joseph's K. C. assistant to the attorney general of Jamaica has been appointed to act as attorney general upon the promotion of Mr. H. K. M. Sissett acting attorney general of British Guiana to Jamaica as puisne judge.
