TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, June 28th.—A capital levy, on a graduated scale, on fortunes from 500 pounds upwards, became an integrated part of the Labour Party's programme today, when a long resolution dealing with national finance was adopted by the Party conferences in session in Queens Hall. Mr. Chas Ammon, labour member for Camberwell, in moving the resolution said the capital levy was the keystone of the whole future of labour finance and

instead of apologizing for it the party was determined to keep it to the forefront in its programme. The resolution declares that the policy of labour is to redeem a substantial portion of the national debt by a levy on capital with a saving in annual interest and a sinking fund thereby being effected, together with other economies, notably on armaments and by the taxation of land values. As a result of the levy, the resolution stated, it would be practicable to abolish the food taxes and lighten the burden of the income tax by raising the exemption limit. Also the entertainment tax and corporations profits tax could be abolished and money provided for much needed social expenditure. The resolution urged the Labour Party in Parliament, in default of a capital levy, to press for abolition of the food taxes before other relief in taxation was given.

Halifax, N. S., June 29th.—That the condition of the Royal Mail Steam Packet liner Carquet is unchanged and that 400 tons of dry cargo were taken from the steamer yesterday, was part of the contents of a cablegram received here last evening by the local manager of the line. The message added that it was expected that an additional 100 tons of dry cargo would be taken from the ship's holds today. Three large Admiralty motor pumps have been installed in the Carquet and it is now thought that it will be possible to salvage the steamer. The wrecking steamer Gritt, at Norfolk, Virginia, has been ordered to the scene of the stranding and is due alongside the

Carquet on Sunday. It will then be decided whether it is possible to salvage the liner or not.

Chantilly, June 28th.—Miss Molly Gourley, of England won the final in the International womens golf championship today defeating Mlle Pauline Debiert, of France, three up and two to play.

Montreal, June 28th.—Montreal anti-Unionists and supporters of the Presbyterian Church in Canada have thrown down the gauntlet and have decided to join corporally in the legal and constitutional resistance to the proposed union with the Methodist and Congregational Churches as sanctioned by the general assembly at Port Arthur recently, federal organization is the immediate aim of the various units and "antis" throughout the Dominion, and it is predicted that such an organization will soon stretch from coast to coast, with headquarters at Toronto. Among the leading counsel is Mr. Chayler K. C. of Kingston and Ottawa.

London, June 28th.—Plans for the re-organization of the Pillsbury Washburn Flour Mill Company Ltd, of England, and the Pillsbury Flour Mills Company, of Minneapolis, into a 2,500,000 pounds American Holding Company, were unanimously approved at a meeting of the shareholders of the British Company here today.

Sydney, N. S. June 29th.—Magistrate Hill was struck on the head by a stone and knocked unconscious tonight, while he was endeavouring to read the riot act at Whitney pier, where a series of raids and clashes between mobs of strikers of the steel company and city police has been in progress. Several policemen who were guarding the Magistrate were injured. The injured Magistrate was not badly hurt. At midnight the city police were in control of the situation.

Sydney, N. S. June 29th.—Incessant raids by gangs of masked men upon the plant and coke ovens, continued throughout the night. Following the stoning of Magistrate Hill, there was comparative quiet for several hours. Then activities commenced again, the mob of masked men broke into the steel plant, defying the guards, searched the blast furnace and other departments for non union workers, who were hauled off their jobs.

London, June 29th.—The first Lord of the Admiralty presided over the meeting of members of Parliament last night, when Lord Beatty, with the aid of the maps and charts, showed why Singapore had been chosen as the naval base in the Pacific. Its position, as a link in the chain of oildepots, stretching from the Mediterranean westwards, was explained, and it was shown how Singapore covered Australia and India from coastal attacks and Africa from commerce raiders.
