The S. S. Guiana from New York arrived at Frederiksted yesterday at 5 p. m. and will sail for the Islands this afternoon. A number of passengers returned home on this trip, including Mr. D. Hamilton Jackson who was given a tremendous ovation on landing in Frederiksted, and was received by a large gathering accompanied by the Century Brass Band which played "Home Sweet Home", etc. All along the centre line long queues of people lined the roadside until late in the evening to greet him when he should pass by. Mr. Jackson will participate in the conferences to adjust the labor situation.

Among the passengers for Christiansted by the Guiana were Mrs. Clindinen and Mrs. J. Meyer, Mr. and Mrs. Pontopidan, and Dr. J. R. Mayhew.

The Guiana brought 59 bags mail for St. Croix of which 41 for Christiansted

were received and delivered here last evening.

Government Secretary Timmons, Chairman of the Commission appointed by the Governor to settle the labor dispute arrived by the Guiana from St. Thomas.

The Creole arrived here this morning with St. Thomas and Porto Rico mails. The Vigilant and Saranac also arrived.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Nov. 10th.—The official programme for the first session of the armament conference was issued today by the State Department. It follows. The first meeting will be held on Saturday November 12th at 10.30 a. m. at the Continental Memorial Hall (hall of the daughters of the American revolution). The doors are to be closed to the public at 10.15 a. m., and it is requested that the delegates be in their places not later than 10.25. "The order of proceedings will be as follows. Prayer will be offered by the Rev. W. S. Abernethy, D. D. Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church of Washington. The President of the United States will then address the conference. "In accordance with the desire which has been expressed on the behalf of the missions, no responses will be made to the President's address, and the President will retire at its conclusion. The Secretary of State of the United States will suggest that the conference proceed with its organization. The election of the Presiding officer of the conference will follow. The presiding officer will then deliver an address. After the selection of the Secretary General and committees on programme and procedure, it will be proposed that the conference adjourn to meet on Tuesday November 15, at 11 a. m. at the Continental Memorial Hall.

London, Nov. 10th.—The full cabinet council, held tonight for the purpose of discussing the Irish situation, was so prolonged that several of the Ministers had suddenly to cancel engagements elsewhere and apologise for the extreme gravity of the business detaining them. It is understood that the Governments written statement on the proposals dealing with Ulster reached Sir James Craig at a late hour, and will be debated at a meeting of the Ulster Ministers at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Kingston, Jca., Nov. 12th.—Armistice Day was commemorated throughout Jamaica yesterday. A special parade took place at Up Park Camp of troops in garrison and the Jamaica militia artillery, Jamaica constabulary and ex-service men in the presence of H. E. the Governor. Opposite the saluting point was a monument emblematical of the Cenotaph on which were inscribed the names of the units with their rolls of honour. On the cenotaph were colours of the regiments and around it an armed guard a number of wreaths were laid at the foot of the cenotaph by various persons, the first by H. E. the Governor.
