At the meeting referred to Mrs. Espersen reported that 131 persons had been aided in various ways, during the past year, by the Christiansted Home Service committee. That is a large number for a community so small as this and shows how great is the need for a strong and active organization with ample means at its disposal.—Com.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, May 23rd.—(United Press) Communists are mustering for their imprisoned comrades for demonstrations in and around the Reichstag at the opening session. While a clamour is raised in the corridors and outside the Parliament Buildings, Communists members plan to demand amnesty for all political prisoners.

Essen, May 23rd.—(United Press) Hope of settling the mine strike and lockout of 60,000 workers in the Ruhr was held out today as new negotiations started here.

Rome, May 23rd.—The Italian dirigible M-1 today completed a successful non-stop flight of 1,500 kilometres in 19 hours partly over the open sea.

Paris, May 23rd.—(United Press.) Despite a pledge of financial stability by M. Herriot, who has succeeded to the Premiership with a government of the Left, the French Franc was worth less today at the opening, being nearly one franc to the dollar lower than yesterday's official closing.

London, May 23rd.—The growing peril of London Streets is seen from statistics issued by Scotland Yard for the first quarter of this year, which show there were 16,691 accidents, of which 175 were fatal. The worst offenders appear to be motor cars, which accounted for 4,834 accidents, trade motors being next with 4,085, motor buses 1,810, tram cars 1,104 taxis 912 and motor cycles.

Leningrad Russia, May 23rd.—Malaria

and other diseases are spreading alarmingly throughout Russia. There is an acute shortage of quinine and other essential drugs. According to a report presented to the Epidemiological Congress here yesterday, there were more than 6,000,000 cases of Malaria in Russia last year, also 300,000 cases of spotted typhus, 250,000 of recurrent typhus and 50,000 of scurvy. The large stocks of quinine and other drugs left by the American relief administration upon its withdrawal, have been exhausted.

London, May 23rd.—Replying in the House of Commons last night to a question by Mr. Rhys (Unionist) Mr. Thomas Secretary for the Colonies, said that the Empire Settlement Act of 1922, for assisting ex-service men to settle in the dominions applied to Irishmen resident in Northern Ireland, but not to citizens of the Irish Free State. The Government he added, was unable to offer assistance to persons under the jurisdiction of a dominion Government.

Paris, May 23rd.—The exploits of Captain Doisy, the French airman who flew from Paris to Shanghai, China, have so stirred French aviators that various attempts at record flights are soon to be made. Colonel Vuillemin is contemplating a flight across Africa to the Cape of Good Hope, it is understood. Lieut. Depuyser expects the Government to authorize a trip to the North Pole, which he is planning to make. Captain Dagneaux plans to fly from France to Madagascar, while captain Girio wants to perform the feat of leaving Paris in the morning, lunching in Algiers and returning to Paris for dinner, or covering 3,000 kilometres by plane in one day.

Ottawa, May 23rd.—The Premier intimated in the House of Commons yesterday that by agreement with the British Government he would on Monday table "certain of the papers respecting the Lausanne Conference and the Lausanne Treaty."

Rome, May 23rd.—Rome is waiting with keen expectancy the reopening of Parliament on Saturday and the King's speech from the Throne. The deputies already are arriving in the Capital and there is keen competition among the people generally for invitations to the opening ceremony. These necessarily are limited in number, owing to the size of the chamber. A military pageant in which nearly 7,000 men and seven military bands will participate, will precede the opening of the session. It is generally believed that the King, in his Speech from the Throne, will make reference to an important reorganization for national defence on land, sea and air, in which the national militia will become an integral part of the armed forces of the State. The belief is expressed in some quarters that it is intended the militia shall become an actual national armed force to guarantee the nation against subversive movements, that the men will receive
