police today raided Liberty Hall, the headquarters of Lakkins transport workers, the headquarters of the grocers assistants association, now on strike, the Gaelic League officers, the rooms of the Leinster College of Irish and numerous private houses. The principal arrests already known is that of Mr. Williams O'Brien, leader of the transport workers, who is prominent in the corporation and recently successfully demanded the removal of the mace and swords. Mr. Hunter, member of Parliament for North East Cork, was also arrested together with his partners, Mr. Peter Clancy, in a tailoring business under the style of "Republican Tailors". The theft of letters of Viscount French which were taken from a mail van by armed men, has created excitement at the military police headquarters and all houses in the district are being searched and numerous arrests made, although the letters and other mail have not yet been discovered.

London, March 4th.—The "Times" today states that the Prince of Wales will probably visit Jamaica and other West Indian centres on his homeward voyage from Australia.

Stockholm, March 4th.—Bitter disappointment with Bolshevism is expressed in an article published presently by Maxim Gorky, the Russian Radical, according to despatches received here. He declares that the men in power now are just as brutal as those in authority under the Imperial regime.

Washington, March 3rd.—The Senate debate today on the Peace Treaty developed some sharp passages when it wandered into the field of European politics. Senator Borah (Republican, Idaho), asserted that the old regime still ruled the European Courts and that the stand of the Allied countries in the Adriatic controversy was only another illustration that the new day prophesied by President Wilson had not come. Senator Hitchcock, (Nebraska), declared that some of the European nations, particularly Great Britain, had become democracies "in some places more responsive to public opinion than the Government of the United States. The voice of an American has become the purring, mewling, mocking voice of a sycophant of Great Britain", Senator Reed, (Democratic), declared, "It is the voice of this Treaty that has poisoned the foundation of pure patriotism for the senior Senator from Nebraska [Hitchcock]. He stands there like a brass monkey, claiming that all is pure and holy over there, while the President is threatening to withdraw the Treaty and the League of Nations because the old Adam still rules diplomacy in Europe. Picture to yourself the Senator walking down the streets of the beautiful city of Omaha arm in arm

with the Mikado of Japan, the Siamese twins of modern Democracy." The subject before the Senate all day was the Shangtung reservation.

Berlin, March 3rd.—The fight to deprive the former Emperor of his properties and his fortune began in earnest yesterday, when a motion by the Majority Socialists of the Diet to refer the issue to the National Assembly precipitated an acrimonious debate, the Majority Socialists vying with the Independents in their denunciation of the former ruler. An effort was made to defeat the proposed settlement by accomplishing the confiscation of the Hohenzollern possessions, but it would have to be done through a constitutional amendment, voting the former emperor a fixed sum for his maintenance. Deputy Greif, of the Majority Socialist, declared that the ex-ruler had failed to live up to the historic precedents of his case. He had not died at the head of his troops, but had chosen instead a midnight flight to Holland, where he was now promenading and sawing wood. The deputy expressed a doubt as to whether the former emperor had subscribed to the war loans as he had claimed, while his claim that he had been the guardian of peace, had been disapproved by his continuous rattling of the sword and proclamations of the mailed fist. The democrats and clericals joined in voting for the Government's measure, providing that same be referred to a Committee. The Judiciary Committee now takes the bill under advisement and conferences are expected to last many weeks. The motion of the Majority Socialists, providing for action by the National Assembly has been temporarily tabled.

Constantinople, March 4th.—In view of the gravity of the situation, the Cabinet resigned today. The Sultan has called upon Marshal Izzet Pasha to form a new cabinet.

London, March 4th.—At an extraordinary meeting of the Royal College of Surgeons at Edinburgh yesterday, it was resolved, says the London "Times" today, that women should be admitted to fellowship in the college.

New York, March 4th.—Four weeks ago, yesterday, the big snow storm of 1920 began here. There are thirty street car lines still out of business and six hundred miles of streets in the outlying section of the city proper have been only partially cleared. Fifty miles of streets in the congested portions of the city have been opened.

Washington, March 3rd.—President Wilson went for a motor ride today, leaving the White House ground for the first time since he was ordered to bed last October. He was accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, Dr. Greyson and Secret Service men.

New York, March 4th.—One reason for the strength in the market is reported that one thousand million dollars in

gold is coming to this country from Europe. Messrs. J. P. Morgan are heavily buying Anglo-French bonds, which is very significant and it may be that England and France propose to ship gold in connection with the purchase of these Anglo-French bonds. France, of course, has a very large supply of gold.

London, March 4th.—The Peace Conference closed its London sessions tonight after preparing the Turkish Treaty and its economic conclusions in a manner so that they may be completed by assistants. The Council will re-assemble early in April at San Remo, Italy, when the negotiations with Jugo-Slavia will be resumed.
